CALL TENDERS MARKET LEASE

Report From Board of Works to This Effect Laid Over For Week by City Council

A report from the board of works recommending that tenders be called for the renting of the city market for a period of five years, all expense involved in making alterations and remodeling to be assumed by the successful tenderer, was submitted at last night's council meeting and was laid over for a week pending the presentation of a by-law governing such lease.

Ald. Collart thought the building was used by the water works department. If it was to be leased where was the equipment of this department to be placed? He was not in favor of renting the building if, by doing so, one business was given advantage over another through low rent. In the past the market had been used for ordinary grocery business.

No Favorites Played

Ald. Casey defended the report at length and said that it was not the intention to give subsidy of cheap rent to an ordinary business. The purpose was to facilitate and encourage the marketing of produce from the agricultural districts adjacent to the city. The lessee would be governed by the city's market bylaw and would come under the supervision of the council. No favorites were being played but simply a call for tenders was being issued. As far as the waterworks department was concerned, there was plenty of room elsewhere in city buildings for the housing of its equipment. Ald. Casey expanded on the necessity of the city encouraging the surrounding agricultural communities. The city looked to the farmers for much of its stable prosperity and it should be willing to assist them.

Masset had No Cold Weather Last Year: Rain Was 62.78 Inches

MASSETT, Feb. 26.—Masset people are feeling happy because their rainfall was less last year than in Prince Rupert. With a total precipitation of 62.78 the islands consider they are getting off very lightly but yet they have sufficient moisture for all purposes.

The minimum temperature was attained last December when the thermometer dropped to 48. The hottest months were July and August when the highest temperature reading was 75. Following is the detail:

RAISE MONEY FOR ELEVATOR

M. Aivazoff Asks City Council if Such Could be Done by Popular Subscription

A letter from M. Y. Aivazoff of Vancouver asking advice as to the possibility of raising money in this city for the building of a 750,000 bushel grain elevator at a cost of from \$500,000 to \$600,000 was received at last night's council meeting and laid over for a week.

Mr. Aivazoff at length outlined the benefit that the city would derive through the establishment of an elevator and suggested that free site and practically free taxation might be obtained. Ship owners, the letter stated, were ready and willing to come here to load grain.

The letter suggested that Mr. Aivazoff would arrive in the city at an early date with an elevator expert.

It was deemed advisable by the council to leave the matter over for a week pending the results of recent investigations made here in this connection being made known. Mr. Albert is being notified accordingly.

NEW ROOF FOR READING ROOM IS RECOMMENDED

Annual Report of Committee Setting Out 1924 Requirements is Received by Council

Recommendations that tenders be called for the usual annual supply of newspapers and magazines and that a new roof be placed on the reading room were contained in a report submitted to the city council by the reading room committee last night.

The first recommendation was adopted, Ald. Clapp, chairman of the reading room committee, stating that the cost would be a little less than last year as a few subscriptions were being cut off.

The matter of roofing was referred to the board of works with power to act. Ald. Clapp stated that the city engineer had deemed a new roof necessary and gave an estimate of \$82. Ald. Perry thought the present roof could be repaired.

MRS. HAY DIED IN VICTORIA SUNDAY

Mrs. David Thomson of This City Bereaved in Demise of Mother After Brief Illness

Mrs. Hay, relict of the late Capt. Charles Hay and mother of Mrs. David Thomson of this city, passed away at 5 o'clock on Sunday afternoon in a Victoria hospital after eight days' serious illness. The funeral will take place in Victoria to which city Mrs. Thomson was called last week, reaching the bed side of her mother before the end.

Mrs. Hay, who was a native of Edinburgh and was 76 years of age, resided in the city for several years and became endeared to a wide circle of friends who will learn with deep sorrow of her demise.
