Farouk Abdicates, Exiled to America Army Forces King to Leave

CAIRO.—Cairo radio today announced King Farouk's abdication from throne of Egypt.

Major League Leaders Both Suffer Loss

NEW YORK (CP)—New York Yankees, American League leaders, and front-running Brooklyn Dodgers of the National League both absorbed defeats Friday night.

Detroit Tigers handed world champion Yankees their third straight setback 2-1 as Steve Souchock boomed a game-winning home run in the last of the ninth inning. Johnny Groth singled home Neil Berry from third for Tigers' tying run in the eighth.

Relief pitcher Ed Yuhas doubled home the tie-breaking run in the seventh inning and St. Louis Cardinals added three more in the ninth to trip the Dodgers 8-4.

Result of the hectic three hours and 12-minute battle cut Brooklyn's lead over New York Giants to 5½ games. Giants downed Cincinnati Reds 3-1.

Early Wynn's six-hit hurling, backed with homers by Jim Began and Larry Doby, gave Cleveland Indians a 4-2 American League victory over Washington Senators. Wynn yielded two runs in the first inning but shut Senators out the rest of way for his 11th victory against eight defeats.

2 Seamen Killed in Collision

VICTORIA (CP)—Two Greek seamen were killed and at least one injured when the Greek freighter Triton and Alaska Steamships vessel Baranof collided off Entrance Island near Nanaimo harbor.

The Triton was believed bound for Japan and Baranof was en route from Seattle to Alaska. Triton was holed amidships with the engine room flooded. The Baranof also was damaged above the waterline.

The Baranof expected to proceed to Vancouver for examination of damage and possible disembarkation of passengers. The Triton was towed to Vancouver if proved seaworthy.

Producers Protest Japanese Invasion of Fish Marketing

WASHINGTON (AP)—A spokesman for the ailing west coast fishing industry today predicted "final ruin" unless tariff relief is forthcoming.

Ray Webb, secretary-treasurer of the Pacific Coast Fish Producers Institute, told Senator Harry P. Cain (R-Wash.) that cheap imports of Japanese-caught tuna—selling for \$107 a ton—were depressing not only the American market for tuna but also for silver salmon (cohoes).

He said American fishermen are now getting only 15½ cents a pound for salmon that last year brought 30 to 40 cents a pound. The same fish, he said, is retailing for 80 cents a pound.

Webb, of Aberdeen, Wash., said in an interview after his visit with Cain that the price of American-caught tuna has dropped to \$200 a ton "and there are no takers."

During the last war American producers received \$650 a ton for tuna.

He said the best Japanese fishermen earn an average of \$16 a month.

"It's simply impossible, he said, "to compete against that type of labor."

Webb described himself as "bitter" against the State Department for failing to take remedial action.

When Matthews And Marciano Square Off Monday

A New Tunney Meets Another Dempsey

NEW YORK—Harry Matthews has the fight mob puzzled.

The boys ride the subway down to 17th Street and climb two flights to watch him work every afternoon. They wait and wait. Nothing happens.

Jack Hurley's protegee glides through a couple of rounds with husky Keene Simmons of Bayonne, N.J., and calls it a day. They have been waiting for him to cut loose. So far he hasn't. But Hurley says he'll be ready for Rocky Marciano Monday at Yankee Stadium.

"He's ready now," said Hur-

ley. "He was ready when he came east from Seattle."

Simmons, a technical knock-out victim of Rocky Marciano's, senses a gradual improvement in Matthews. Simmons was stopped by a cut eye.

"He hits a little better every day," said Simmons. "He hit me a pretty good right hand Tuesday. No, not much in the stomach. He's taking it easy on me."

Matthew's best move is to slide away to his right and then throw a quick counter right. He does it once or twice a day with Simmons. In his shadow boxing later, he digs those hard rights to the body.

Democrats Name Stevenson As Candidate For President

First Canadian Wins Gold Medal For Clay-Pigeon Shooting Event

HELSINKI (CP)—George Genereux of Saskatoon, today won a gold medal in the Olympic clay pigeon-shooting event with 192 hits out of a possible 200.

Galina Qybina, of Russia, broke the world record for women's shotgun with a heave of 15.28 metres in competition for the Olympic championship.

Jewelry Missing After Early Morning Break-in

Five rings and three watches valued at about \$300 were stolen from Bulger's jewelers early today after thieves smashed a huge plate glass window with a stone.

The theft occurred about 4 a.m.

John Bulger, Sr., was called to the scene by police and had the window boarded up.

A similar theft occurred 15 years ago when thieves smashed a window and escaped with a tray of diamonds.

Chilliwack Farmers Crack Strike

CHILLIWACK, B.C. (CP)—Some 50 farmers in trucks drove through picket lines at a strike-bound vegetable canning plant near here late Friday and started processing peas.

Spokesmen for United Packinghouse Workers claimed two pickets were run down by trucks. They did not say whether the pickets were injured.

Officials of the Canada Packers plant later brought foremen and engineers into the plant, escorted by police.

Farmers—there were several women among them—claimed they would lose \$50,000 unless their pea crop was processed. About 40 per cent of the crop had been processed when 200 canners went on strike Tuesday for a 15-cents-an-hour raise.

Republicans Move to Woo Independents

DENVER (AP)—Political advisers to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, the Republican presidential nominee, have set up a program aimed primarily at wooing Independents and disgruntled Democrats to his support.

The move is based, these advisers said, on a call by the General for continuation and expansion of the National Citizens for Eisenhower Committee—an organization they credited with having played a major role in his successful bid for the nomination.

Senator James H. Duff of Pennsylvania outlined the plan at a press conference last night after he and two other Eisenhower leaders had conferred with the General at his vacation retreat near Fraser, Colo.

Duff, Governor Dan Thornton of Colorado, and Ralph Calkins, Republican National Committee man from Oregon, spent most of the day with Eisenhower.

\$100 Fine For Illegal Fishing

A Port Edward fisherman, Fumio Hamaguchi, was fined \$100 and costs here today for unlawfully fishing in Edye Pass.

G. S. Reade, supervisor of fisheries, said Hamaguchi, a sockeye salmon gillnetter, was caught by the fisheries patrol boat MJ yesterday at Useless Creek.

Fish in his boat—71 sockeye, five pounds of coho; 13 pinks and seven pounds of steelhead—were seized.

Truman Hands Over Standard; Sparkman Likely For Veep

CHICAGO.—Governor Adlai Stevenson today will pick a running mate to help him "talk sense to American people" in campaign to keep presidency in Democratic hands.

Nominated on third ballot, the 52-year-old Illinois governor is reported to have chosen Senator John Sparkman of Alabama for vice-presidential candidate.

Sparkman has said he will accept if nominated.

Passed over in this reported decision were Senator Richard Russell of Georgia, who ran second to Stevenson in the final balloting, Vice-President Alben Barkley and Senator Estes Kefauver, who said he had never considered the vice-presidency.

President Truman turned over to Stevenson the Democratic standard and looked forward to the role of elder statesman.

In a sort of swan song, Truman offered to "whistle stop" the country for his successor.

In his acceptance speech Stevenson said "more important than winning the election is governing the nation."

Asserting that the bloodiest, most turbulent age of the Christian era is far from over, he said "sacrifice, patience, understanding and implacable purpose may be our lot for years to come. Let's face it. Let's talk sense to the American people."

NO PROMISES

It was not the usual recital of glowing promises of future and laudatory references to the party's past record expected from most nominees.

Stevenson told reporters what he has been saying for months: "I didn't seek it, I didn't want it." But he accepted "with humility."

Why did so many Democrats work so hard to press nomination on him?

Because they say he has what it takes—some call it political sex appeal—to defeat the Republican standard bearer, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower.

His voice is warm and resonant. He can make a sparkling speech, put across with an incandescent smile, spry gestures and with expressive use of electric blue eyes.

Young Lad Hero In Jungle Ambush

SINGAPORE (Reuters)—it may have been just another skirmish in Britain's war with the Communist guerrillas, but to Terry Edmett it was the greatest moment of his 14 years.

The lad, son of an English rubber planter, crouched behind the wheel of an armored car and drove his parents and his younger brother to safety through a hail of bullets in a jungle ambush yesterday.

When the Communists sprang their trap in the Kotatingi area of Johore the boy was driving his father's armored car out to inspect the rubber estate L. D. Edmett manager.

Suddenly terrorists poured in fire from a jungle thicket, the Edmetts returning it from the armored car.

Terry never hesitated. Up the road he went, only to find a burned-out truck had been pushed across as a block by the bushwackers.

He changed into low gear, and nudged the block into the ditch. Still under fire, he got the car past.
