RAILWAY HEAD IN RADIO TALK

Urge Employees to be Diligent
and Keen in Interests of
National Railway

ANSWERS HIS CRITICS

Extends Invitation to Listeners
in South to Visit Canada
and Enjoy Life

WINNIPEG, Feb. 21.—"We welcome every form of investigation and we wish our accounting and finance to be surrounded with every precaution but we would object to perpetual investigations by prejudiced individuals which would have for their object keeping the administration in constant turmoil and acquiring information for the use of those who are opposed to the welfare of the system," stated Sir Henry Thornton, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways in a radio talk with Western employees of the system, by remote broadcast from station CFCN at Calgary last night. In this connection he explained further that the accounting rules and practices which are followed by the Canadian Pacific and the important railways in the United States, "so if anyone tries to pull your leg with regard to our accounting methods or the existence of our \$20,000,000 net earnings, you can ram the above down their throats."

Following up the successful experiment in remote broadcasting last week by a C. N. official by means of long distance telephone connection between Calgary and Winnipeg, Sir Henry, the words of the ignorant critic, who fail to understand that the human element is the largest factor in the success of any railway. And it is also to be remembered that while I am talking to those of you who are employees, a large number of the people of both Canada and the United States are listening in and learning something about the Canadian National Railway system, I welcome that great intelligent audience.

"I would like to talk, if I had the time, of what a wonderful country is the Dominion of Canada, how many advantages there are for those who are willing to work and how many delights and pleasures there are for the tourist, but that I must leave to others. Let me only say this, especially to our friends across the border, come up and ride our railway, see what our service is like, fish in our lakes and rivers, hunt in our forests and look up on the beauty of our mountain scenery, and then, if you go back I know you will return, and perhaps if you return again you will have come to stay."

Audit of Accounts

Urging that every employee be alert to the possibilities presented them for attractive business, Sir Henry pointed out that the united effort of 100,000 employees working in the same direction becomes an irresistible force. Prevention of waste, cleanliness, fire protection, unfailing courtesy to the public were also points touched upon by the speaker in a friendly way.

He then mentioned the agitation being made in certain quarters for a public audit of Canadian National accounts and explained the system whereby the same are under constant scrutiny and are continuously audited by the firm of George T. Touché and Company, a reputable international firm of chartered accountants.

Before closing Sir Henry expressed his confidence in the capable, loyal lot of men in the service, who are proud of the company and the record it has made, and who are striving each year to produce better results than the previous year. That being the case the time had come when as self-respecting individuals they would not permit vicious and ill-considered criticism of the railway or any one in its employ to pass unchallenged.

CONSTRUCTIVE CRITICISM
"Constructive criticism which is meant for the purpose of improving our methods we all welcome, but the other kind, which is based on prejudice and intended for destructive purposes we must, as self respecting men at once challenge. Therefore, if we stand together and in a dignified fashion protect the interests of ourselves and our company we shall have gone a long way to excite that respect which I think your services merit."

LASCIVIOUS DANCES ARE TABOO WITH CATHOLICS

Quebec Priest Further Enlarges
on Pronouncement of Cardinal Begin

QUEBEC, Feb. 20.—(Canadian Press) — The exact bearing of the pastoral letter issued some time ago by Cardinal Begin regarding alleged lascivious dances was further explained on a recent Sunday by Mgr. Laflamme, parish priest, at the Quebec Basilica, who warned the faithful against any light interpretation of the document, stating that the object was to bar these dances forever from the social life of Catholics.

Defining some parts of the important document, he stated that when it was issued it was regarded as urgent to do so in order to prevent further abuses. Though the edict had been generally well obeyed, some people had commenced placing their own private interpretation on it. These people had apparently been under the impression that the letter meant only that such dances as were referred to had been banned. Mgr. Laflamme stated that such was not the case. Dances as described in the pastoral were forbidden as mortal sins. Dancing in homes was not allowed, even between relatives. In regard to man and wife, if they want to dance, they should not dance in public or even before their children. Dancing between people of the same sex was also taboo.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timbered, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on Crown land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumps.

HOUSES

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts

and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free
