

Peculiar Statement

"That portion of your article which reads: "His idea is not to prohibit the landing of American halibut from fishing vessels at the Canadian port, but same duty paid on Canadian halibut?" is peculiar.

"The writer wonders how American fishermen would like to be charged a duty of 2c per pound on their fish. We also wonder whether the Canadian authorities are going to sit back and allow the U.S. authorities to impose a 2c per pound duty on a product which is the means of a considerable industry in their territory. If the Canadian authorities were to place an embargo upon halibut originating in the conditions suggested in your article, we are inclined to believe that there would be some long faces pulled amongst not only the American Mishermen but also amongst a number of Alaska interests who are depending upon the American fisherman for their livelihood. may be that at certain times of the year Ketchikan could pay as high as, if not a higher price than can be obtained in Prince Rupert but only when small quantities are available which can be absorbed in the local markets of Seattle or Pacific vessel owners whom I have in-Coast markets and not during the terviewed (and I know most of months of heavy production them) are emphatically opposed when Ketchikan or the whole of to Mr. Strong's proposal.
