DAWSON ADDRESSES VANCOUVER BOARD

Tells Them of Advantages of Prince Rupert and Urges Development of Whole Province

Some marvellous geographical facts were suggested by F. G. Dawson, a director of the Canadian National Railways, during the course of an address on "the export possibilities of Prince Rupert," delivered before the foreign bureau of the Board of Trade says the Vancouver Evening Sun. As Prince Rupert was 450 miles nearer the Orient than any other port. Taking the average speed of tramp steamers and also of railway freight trains into consideration he showed how, from the exporter's point of view, Edmonton was moved onto the Pacific coast through shipping from Prince Rupert. He then went further and declared that taking the speed of the fast silk trains in comparison with the speed of steamers Saskatoon was figuratively moved to the Pacific coast in comparing Prince Rupert with other Pacific ports.

Mr. Dawson urged the necessity of all British Columbia business men getting together and developing the province. Within five years, he stated, 50 per cent of all the grain grown on the prairies would be taken over the western route.

SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, "How to Pre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C., or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering only land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that Range.

Applications for pre-emptions are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emptions must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 40 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

HOMESITE LEASES Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 30 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

LEASES For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

GRAZING Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers fanged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, campers and travellers, up to ten head.
