DAVIES ADDRESSES CARPENTERS HERE

Is Optimistic Over Outlook And Sees Great Opportunities In Northern B. C.

A. M. Davies, of Victoria, delegate for British Columbia to the International Brotherhood of carpenters and joiners of America, gave an address last night to carpenters of the city in the Carpenter's Hall. Mr. Davies, who is very optimistic as to the future commercial prosperity of northern B. C. as affecting the wood working industry, is in the north looking over the business situation in that connection.

In the course of his address, Mr. Davies stated that the sash and door manufacturers of British Columbia have a good opportunity to secure large orders from Great Britain if they will comply with the request of the overseas trade that all sashes and doors bear the union label. The number of open shops in this industry in British Columbia had made it somewhat difficult to comply with this request but a movement is now under way by the unions throughout the country to overcome this difficulty. If Canadian manufacturers can compete with the Scandinavian product, a tremendous volume of business can be secured in this country, according to Mr. Davies.

BRITISH COLUMBIANS FINED FOR FISHING IN ALASKAN WATERS

Well Known Men Apprehended by Coast Guard Cutter Smith and Taken to Ketchikan

KETCHIKAN, July 24.—J. McLeod, J. P. Reid and H. Selig pleaded guilty in the commissioner's court to a charge of illegally fishing in American waters while aliens, and not having declared their intention to become citizens. 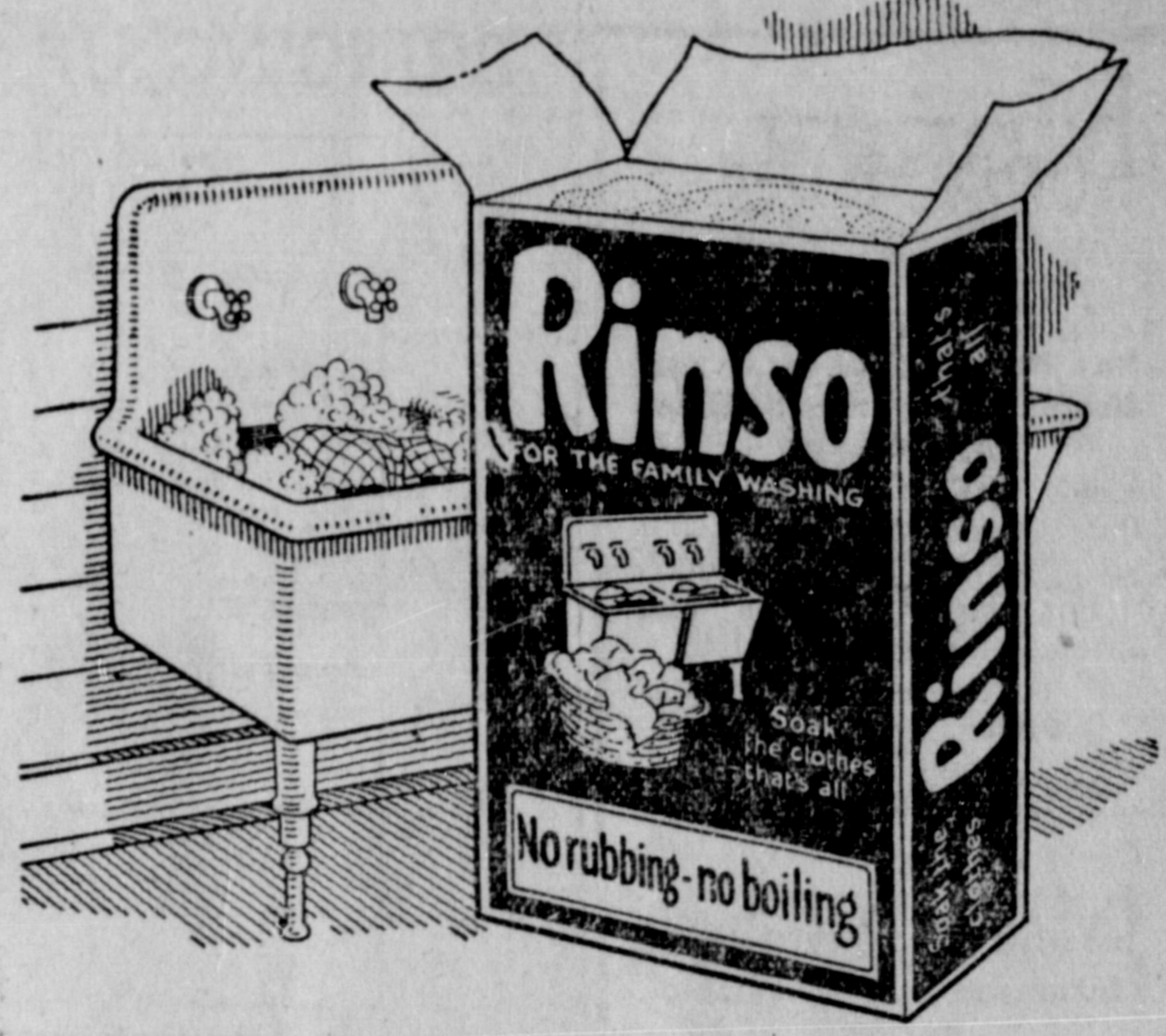

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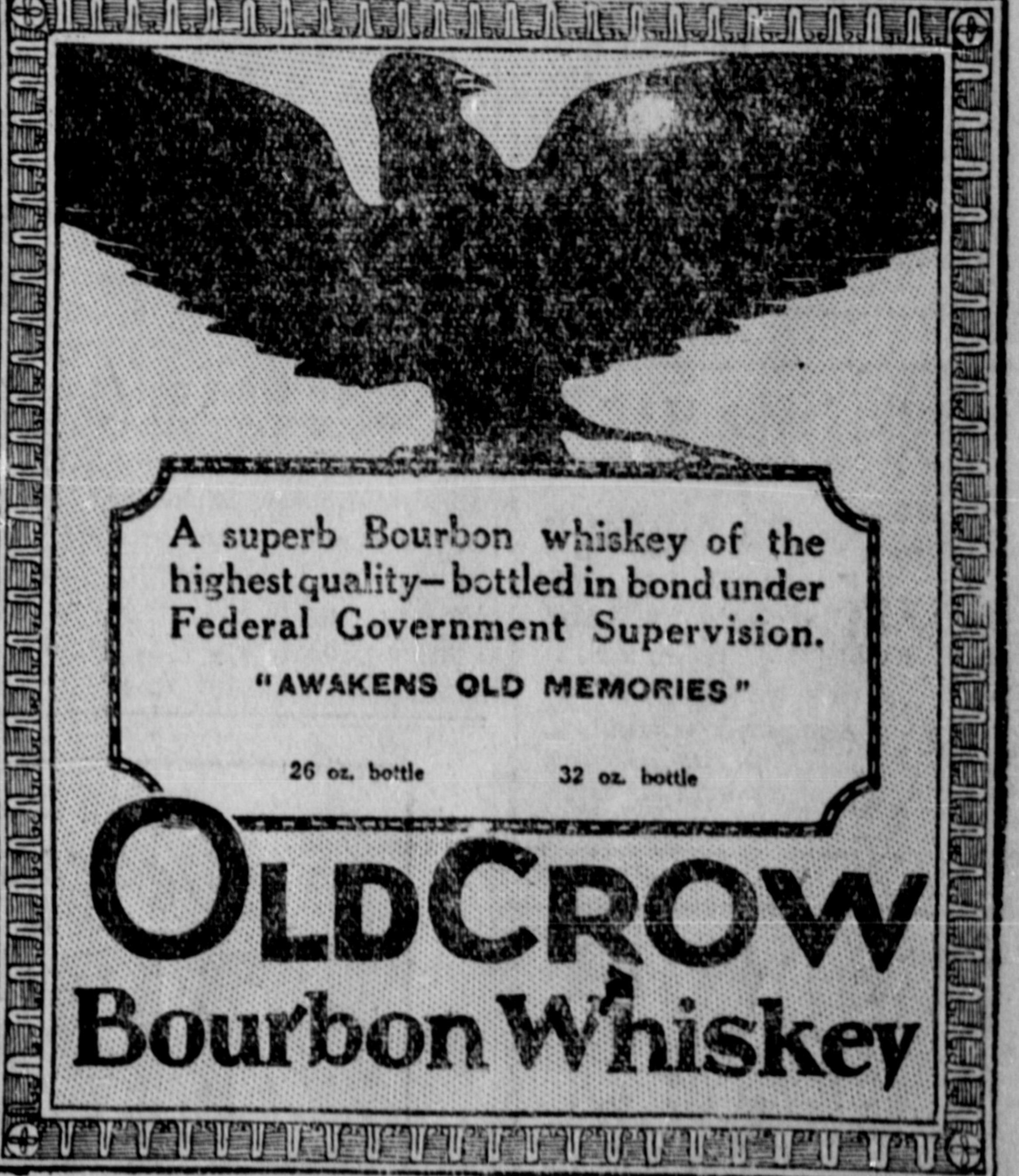

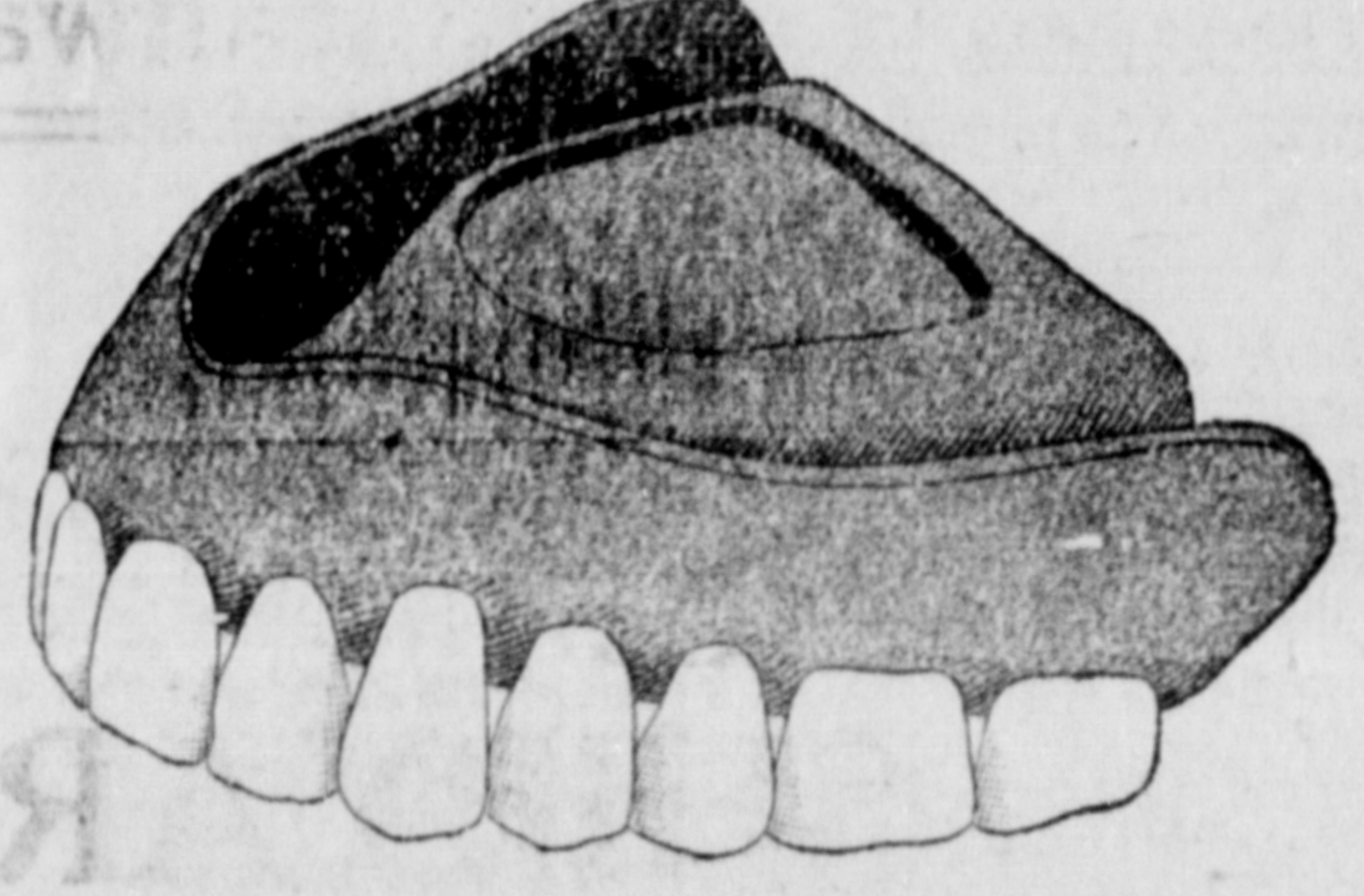
