Hearty Welcome To British Flyers.

The Daily News joins with the rest of the city of Prince Rupert in welcoming Stuart MacLaren and his hardy companions after their splendid attempt at flying around the world.

For many weeks through the news despatches we have watched their careers. We have entered into their disappointments when they have met with mishap and have been buoyed up with renewed hope as they again set out on their perilous journey.

Visit Of British Association.

The British Association is visiting Canada and for a week past has been holding meetings in Toronto. Now they are to tour the west and they will hold more meetings at various university centres.

Unfortunately there seems to have been no provision made for a visit of the scientists here, the only point where they could have investigated the most important fisheries in Canada.

Complaint has been made from time to time that scientists are interested in abstruse subjects but are not willing to engage in the study of such simple matters as the life history of the halibut, a subject which is of so great importance in relation to the food supply of the continent.

It is to be hoped that many of the members of the association will come north from Vancouver and return east by way of Prince Rupert.

Need The Hotel And More Boats.

What is needed here is the promised tourist hotel and more boats for the coast service. Just now there is not accommodation for any large body of tourists such as the British Association, in addition to the regular coast traffic.

Stability Of City Indicated By Taxes.

The manner in which taxes are paid here is an indication of the stability of the city. City Treasurer Matheson announces that 83.7 per cent of all collectable taxes were paid before the end of last month.

This payment of taxes is an indication that people have faith in the future of the city. In many cases the lands on which taxes have been paid are not even facing on roads and depend wholly for their value on future developments.

HUGE INITIAL INVESTMENT NECESSARY

ACTUAL VALUE OF B.C. TIMBER LIES IN ITS MERCHANTABILITY

Vast Purchasing Power of the Forest Industries of the Province

Imagine the vastness of the investment that was necessary to build up the British Columbia forest industries to their present capacity.

Hundreds of thousands of dollars must be expended before a foot of lumber can be produced in an up-to-date sawmill of large capacity.

Millions of feet of standing timber must be secured whilst the purchase of modern logging and mill equipment entails an enormous preliminary outlay.

In the manufacture of pulp and paper, the harnessing up of the necessary water-power and the cost of super-expensive machinery means that further millions must be sunk in the plant and in extended timber limits before a wheel can be turned in a completed mill.

Demand Sets Value British Columbia will never make progress by the scenic value of its unique timber alone. The actual worth of this wonderful, but mature, raw material is entirely in proportion to the chances it presents of attracting capital for its conversion into saleable products.

It is reckoned that the sum invested in the forest products industries of B.C. is between \$150,000,000 and \$200,000,000. This is probably as much as the whole stumpage of British Columbia is worth today as a merchantable proposition.

It must also be remembered that in addition to their investment the holders, manufacturers and distributors of B.C. forest products represent a spending power of approximately \$100,000,000 per annum, in the circulation of which practically every man, woman and child in the Province benefits to some extent, great or small.

A set-back to the timber industries would be the greatest economic fatality that could befall the Province.

WINNIPEG BOARD OF TRADE COMING WEST FAR AS JASPER PARK

WINNIPEG, Aug. 15—Arrangements for a business trip through Western Canada, promoted by the Winnipeg Board of Trade have been completed and the party will launch upon its journey on August 18. It is expected that about 125 local businessmen will make the trip, while invitations have been extended to the Chambers of Commerce of the border states, the boards of trade, Montreal and Toronto have also been asked to send representatives.

The party will travel on the Canadian Pacific Railway lines as far as Edmonton where a transfer will be made to the Canadian National Railway for Jasper Park. The return trip will be made over the government road to Winnipeg.
