SCIENTISTS TO VISIT COAST

Leaving Tomorrow in Special Trains for Points of Interest

TORONTO, Aug. 16. — More than four hundred delegates to the British Association for the advancement of science and the mathematical congress conventions which have just closed here leave Toronto tonight for Vancouver. Two special trains will be required to carry the party which is one of the largest special passenger traffic movements ever handled by the Canadian National railways. The trains will follow each other thirty minutes apart, the first train leaving the Union station at 7.25 o'clock standard time.

The trip across Canada has been carefully prepared by the Canadian committee of the British Association working in close co-operation with passenger traffic officers of the National System and the itinerary decided upon is of an instructive as well as scenic nature. Visits will be paid to mining and paper making industries in Ontario and to agricultural colleges, universities and lumbering industries in the west. Three full days will be occupied with the rail trip from Toronto to Winnipeg, stops ranging from three to twelve hours having been arranged en-route between these two points, the main places of interest being Coahll, Swastika, Timmins and Iroquois Falls.

Visit to Mines
Hon. C. R. McCrae, minister of mines in the Ontario government will accompany the party to Timmins and will personally conduct the scientists over the mining properties in Northern Ontario. The first train is scheduled to reach Winnipeg at 7.15 o'clock Wednesday evening and the travellers will make their headquarters at the Fort Garry Hotel until the following night. On Thursday they will receive an official welcome from Premier Bracken and will visit the Manitoba Agricultural College, the plant of the Hydro-Electric System at Point Du Bois and the University.

At Saskatoon which will be reached Friday morning the visitors will take part in the formal opening of the new chemical laboratories of the University of Saskatchewan. Several of the various sections will also hold meetings and a number of papers will be read. Afternoon tea on the University grounds and a picnic supper at the Forestry Station have been arranged for.

Deliver Addresses
All day Saturday will be spent in Edmonton. Several meetings will be held at the University there and there will be an official welcome from the Lieutenant Governor and the Premier of the Province. In the evening following a banquet tendered them by the University they will conduct a public meeting at which addresses will be delivered by Sir David Bruce, Sir John Russell, Sir William Beveridge and J. S. Flett.

Sunday they will spend in the Rocky Mountains with a stop over at Jasper Park Lodge as the guests of the Canadian National Railways and then a brief one at Mount Robson, Vancouver will be reached early Monday morning. The party will divide at this point, some going to Victoria, some to the mining and lumbering districts while others remain in Vancouver.

S. Osborne Scott and H. F. Tilley of the passenger traffic department of the Canadian National Railways will be in charge of the two trains.

Antonia. The party will leave Quebec for Canadian National Railway for Vancouver, stopping at all the larger cities enroute, where arrangements have been made with various service clubs for their entertainment.

Among the points to be visited are Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, Niagara Falls, Sarnia, Port Arthur, Winnipeg, Regina, Saskatoon, Calgary, Edmonton, Jasper and Vancouver.
