since I was first elected to the presidency of your organization. Each of these years has been marked by something in the nature of a crisis in which its continued existence as a national entity seemed to be endangered.

"At last this non-profit making company of daily newspaper publishers is freed from even the suspicion of control by outside influences; at last we have the true spirit of co-operation among our members-East and West; at last we have such reserves of power that even suggestions of possible disintegration must appear absurd.

Annual Grants "As you all know, at the 1923

annual grants to the Canadian Press of \$50,000 for the leased wires across the three sparsely settled gaps and \$8,000 toward the supplementary cable service from Britain. Your management heard that an attack was coming. but, having in mind the unsavory flavor this governmental assistance had to many of our members, the only step taken to meet it was to provide the Prime Minister and the Minister of Finance with a memorandum explaining fully and clearly the original reasons for these grants and the manner in which the money had been spent from year to year. The attack was participated in by only two members of Parliament and the grants were defended on the ground of national advantlage by both Mr. Mackenzie King and Mr. Fielding.

"The two items went through Parliament, but at the close of the session we were notified that the grants would not be renewed on the following year. Even if we had not been notified. I believe your Board of Directors would have found it necessary to recommend you to decline the grants in future so that the Company would never again be in the position where it could be made the subject of such irresponsible and slanderous statements.
