

### CROSSES ARRIVE IN CITY FOR REGIMENT

Will be Suitably Preserved in Memory of Men Killed in Action

Two large wooden regimental crosses of the 102nd Battalion C.E.F., raised on the battlefields of Flanders as temporary memorials to officers, N.C.O.'s and men of the regiment killed in action in the Great War, have arrived in the city.

The various wooden crosses erected on the battlefields by the Canadian regiments are gradually being replaced with crosses of a permanent nature by the Canadian War Graves Commission by whom the 102nd Battalion's crosses were forwarded.

Most of the temporary Canadian regimental monuments of this nature have now been sent to Canada and are preserved, in the majority of cases, in the various churches and cathedrals.

Steps will be taken by the members of the 102nd Battalion to suitably preserve the crosses of their regiment.
