CAPETOWN, April 24. - The Republican bogey in the Union of South Africa is killed so far as the Nationalist party is concerned, as a result of a speech made yesterday by General Hertzog, leader of the opposition to General Smuts in the South African Parliament. The Nationalist leader said the Republican doctrine had never been on the Nationalist program. The party would be foolish to press this issue unless the English people of the country as well as the Dutch favored it. He said that sovereign independence had already been secured by the Union.
