REGIMENT WON CHALLENGE CUP

Shoot Yesterday Was Between Police and Soldiers With Latter Victorious

Yesterday the Corporation Challenge Cup was won by a team representing the First Battalion North British Columbia Regiment at the McNicholl rifle ranges. The highest individual record was made by Inspector A. E. Acland of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police with the creditable score of 91. The soldiers, however, had the highest aggregate score of 444 against the team selected from the mounted and provincial police which made 327. The scores were:

The Corporation Cup—a challenge cup put up by the city of Prince Rupert in 1911, and open to rifle teams in northern B.C., was won in 1911 and 1912 by the Prince Rupert Civilian Rifle Association and in 1913 by the Earl Grey Rifles, which was the last team to win the cup. The Yankees and Washington will eb away from home the most of September so that may be some advantage for Detroit, but the St. Louis Browns who are also still in the running for the American League pennant, will be at home most of the month and there is a chance that they may enter into the final argument. With the American League teams continuing to run as closely as they have been all season, it may take the last few games in October to settle things.

STEWART, Aug. 25.—On August 16 in the Opera House here, an eight round bout was staged between Young Dando and Harold Blanton of Hyder, the latter being given the judges' decision by a narrow margin. The boys were evenly matched and the contest went the full distance. In the third round, Dando had his opponent in distress and had followed up the advantage he had at that time, his opponent would likely have hit the boards. From this round on both boxers mixed things with Dando going strong and Blanton apparently tiring. Dando scored several times with clean, straight lefts to the face while Blanton was content to swing wild with many clinches resulting. Dando was pushed to the ropes and forced to cover several times. Blanton was given the decision though this was not approved by the majority of the spectators who would have favored a draw.

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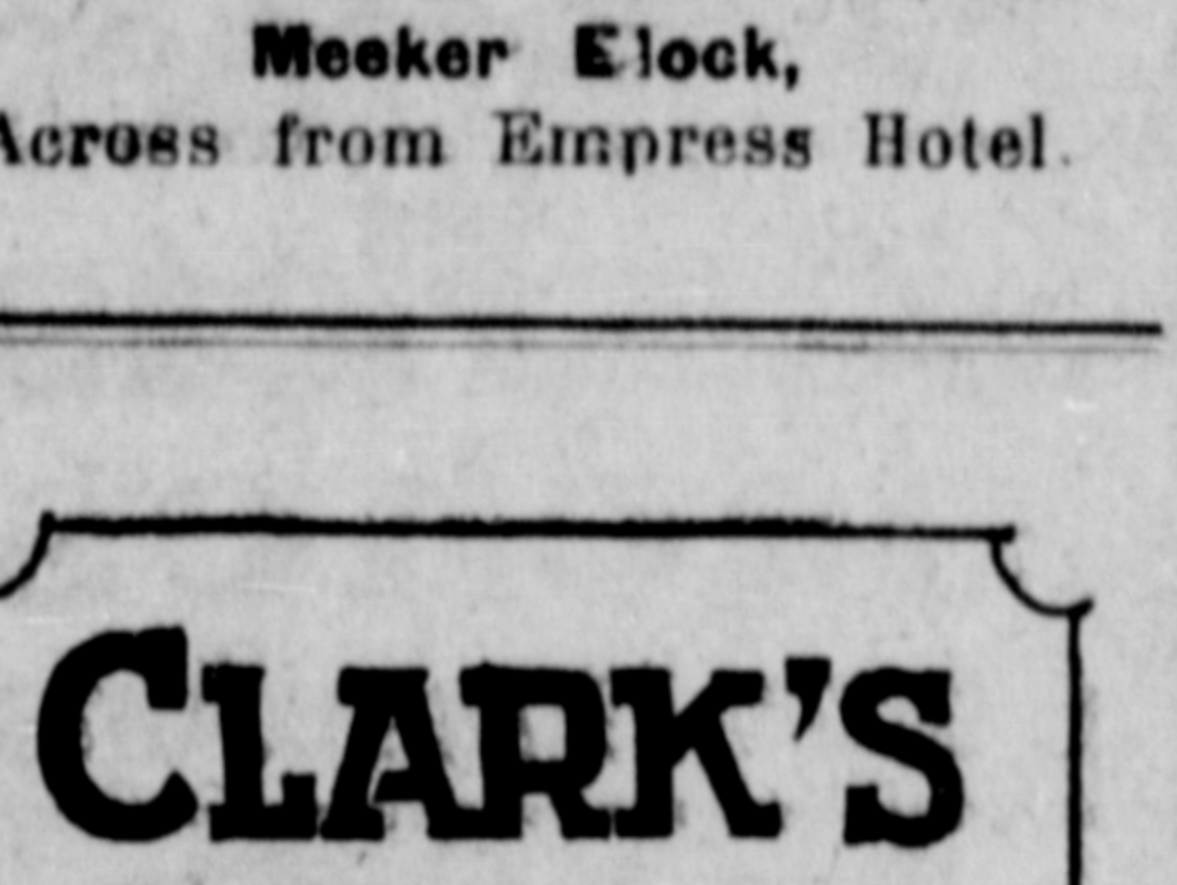
