LOOK FOR LAND OF HOT SPRINGS

Grass is Always Green There and no Winter Comes on Yukon Boundary

Major and Mrs. Gooch of Crawford Bay, B.C., well known in Edmonton, are leaving in a few weeks for the most northerly portion of British Columbia, and will endeavor to locate the valley of hot springs close to the Yukon boundary where the grass is said to remain green the year around says the Edmonton Bulletin.

A report of this valley was brought to the "outside" by Frank Perry, the well known mining engineer of Vancouver and at that time published exclusively in the Bulletin. The report of the discovery stirred the imagination of many people, as the article was copied widely throughout the United States and Canada.

Account Astonishing

Perry has lived alone in the far north—in entirely unknown territory—for seventeen years; he travelled with nothing but a single pack dog, a rifle, a copy of a geological treatise, and made a number of wonderful discoveries—mineral and otherwise. For years at a time he never saw a living person, Indian or White, and on his return to civilization brought out an astonishing account of the wonders to be encountered.

In the valley spoken of Perry claimed that due to the number of hot springs, the temperature was an even one the whole year around; that the animals having their habitat there were so fat they could not move faster than a walk, while the vegetation was described as abnormal, with shrubs growing to the size of trees, and black loam soil forty and more feet deep.

Mastodon Bones Found

He also claims to have seen the bones of mastodons protruding from the cliffs, and the sandstones marked with the impressions of three-toed prehistoric animals. For many years the Indians had brought word of this valley to the fur traders at Fort Nelson and Fort Liard, but the stories were discounted as being "Indian yarns."

Old timers in the far north are of the opinion that it is possible such a valley does exist as is described, and Major and Mrs. Gooch are determined to find it.

Two years ago they spent the summer in the North West Territories, going down on the Alberta and Arctic company's steamer to the mouth of the Mackenzie, and later returning to the point where the Great Slave lake flows into the Mackenzie where they remained to fish.

Both are experienced travellers in this and other countries, and it is quite possible that they may win a way through to Perry's valley.

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BORED STIFF PREACHING

Church Must do More to Relieve Misery, Ignorance, Drunkenness, Squalor and Villeness

BIRMINGHAM, July 16.—The moral status of Birmingham, one of the foremost of the manufacturing towns of Great Britain, was severely attacked by Rev. T. Edmunds in an address at the opening session of the conference of the West Midlands Baptist Association here.

"Birmingham," the speaker said, "is a pagan city with misery, ignorance, drunkenness, squalor, villeness in its midst which create a desperate need for social service. If the Christian church is to be of real beneficent service," he argued, "we will have to do more than sing, pray, preach and teach."

Rev. J. Leslie Brown, of Wolverhampton, declared at the conference that he was "bored stiff" with preaching. What was the good of preaching when present conditions existed, he asked. He said he believed that many of the church leaders were on the wrong lines, and asked if they had any idea of what they were talking about and driving at.

PICTURESQUE SCENE IN ENGLISH COURT

Steer Roper Has Loaded Gun on Hip and Cow Boys Delight Women

LONDON, July 16.—There was great excitement in the rather remote village of Wealdstone when the long legal struggle began in the police court there over the allegations of cruelty in the steer roping competitions. There was a crowd, chiefly of women, in the street, who were delighted with the opportunity of seeing the cowboys at close quarters, and the climax of the hero-worship when Mr. Tex Austin, complete in his huge white hat, drove up in a motor with a steer's horns fixed to the front.

The cowboys wore their gaily-colored shirts, high boots, and spurs, and looked the part to perfection. When the hearing was over they were kept busy signing women's autograph albums, which they did with gracious smiles. They looked rather uncomfortable and out of place in the intensely hot and overcrowded little court.

There was some dispute about what kind of revolver was used to shoot the wretched steer that broke its leg, and Mr. Tex Austin, who was standing near the magistrate, tall, handsome, and polished looking, produced the identical gun out of his hip pocket, murmuring the words: "Sure, it's loaded." There was a little disquiet in the ranks of the eminent lawyers, and Sir Edward Marshall Hall rather nervously told him to unload it.

ISLAND WHALE OIL IS SHIPPED TO VICTORIA

Canadian Freighter Taking Out Cargo of 220 Tons for United Kingdom

Whale oil from the Pacific is going out on the Canadian Government Merchant Marine steamer Canadian freighter, for Liverpool, says the Victoria Colonist. This vessel calls at the port of Victoria today, when she will pick up to 220 tons of whale oil from the Consolidated Whaling Corporation before sailing for the United Kingdom.

The Government steamers have secured the contract to bring south all the product of the Consolidated Whaling Corporation from the stations at Rose Harbor and Naden Harbor, Queen Charlotte Islands.

This was one of the reasons why the steamer Gray was chartered, pending purchase of a freight carrier by the Government company for the Queen Charlotte run. The Gray has been in port at Vancouver, loading north on her first voyage.

NEW YORK, July 16.—Richard Marsh, civil engineer and explorer, who has arrived here on the liner Calameres, has with him three "white Indians" discovered in the San Blas wilderness, Panama.
