CHAMONIX, Jan. 30. - Great Britain won the championship here today in the final curling competition. She defeated France by a score of 46 to 4. Sweden third.

WILL FIGHT TAX ON

JUNEAU, Jan. 30. - Suit has' been begun here to test the validity of the graduated tax on canned salmon output, ranging from 2 cents to 20 cents per case, depending upon the size of the pack, adopted by the last legislature.

The suit was brought in the name of the Pacific American Fisheries Co., but all the canneries are said to be behind it.

Attorney General John Rustgard announced that he will bring suits immediately against all canneries that have not paid their taxes in full under the graduated tax law.
