OTTAWA, April 16 .- Reading of documents on file in the finance department with regard to the Home Bank occupied the initial sitting of the Royal Commission investigating the history and collapse of the Home Bank. Complaints of the three western directors against certain transactions of the bank were revealed in the communications sent to the department in 1916.
