



EASTER MARKET WELL SUPPLIED

Many Fresh Vegetable Lines Bo-
ing Offered this Week—
Potato Prices Easier

TURNIPS TO VANCOUVER

Butter, Sugar and Hams Down—
Price on Eggs is Stiffening

The local retail market is well supplied for Easter Week in green vegetables and other produce. Due to arrive are the following: celery, new cabbage, parsley, sweet potatoes, lettuce, spinach, cucumbers, tomatoes, radishes, green onions, asparagus and rhubarb. The price of rhubarb is down considerably since the last quotation was made.

Good onions are firmer in price and the best quality large size stock is none too plentiful at present. California cabbage is arriving in good shape and the prevailing price of 12½c per pound seems likely to hold for some little time.

The potato market locally is well supplied, with prices easier owing to the arrival of Alberta stock. Up country spuds are also easier in sympathy with the imported line. Genuine No. 1 Canada grade A potatoes are scarce this year and growers who have such stock do not fear that the market will drop. It is more likely to go higher.

Shipping to Vancouver

Through a local firm, the first carload of interior turnips will make their appearance on the Vancouver market within the next fortnight or so. This trial shipment will be followed by many more if the anticipated success is achieved. The shippers understand their market and, therefore, none but the best will be sacked. New sacks, nicely lettered and holding uniform weights, will command the attention of the southern dealers.

The butter market is weak and prices on all lines are due for a decline of 5¢ per pound effective Easter Monday. The egg market is firm due to considerable storage activity. B.C. eggs have advanced slightly and pullets, considerably. The latter are scarce and will soon be off the market. The price of sugar has dropped 50¢ a hundred during the past fortnight and ham and bacon prices are down about six percent due to the sales tax being cut off them.

PROCLAMATION

BYNG OF VIMY
[L.S.]

CANADA

GEORGE THE FIFTH, by the Grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, KING, Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India.

To all to whom these Presents shall come, or whom the same may in anywise concern,

GREETING:

A PROCLAMATION
E. L. NEWCOMBE, Deputy Minister of Justice, Canada

WHEREAS the protection and perpetuation of our forests are vital for the continued industrial welfare and national strength of Canada and to its individual health, comfort and prosperity;

And Whereas it is shown by the statistics of the several forest authorities of the Dominion that the forest resources have suffered enormous losses through the occurrence of forest fires and that the loss through such fires has far exceeded in amount the depletion in timber wealth through legitimate cutting operations;

And Whereas Our Dominion is recognized as the main source of supply of coniferous timber within Our Empire and it is essential that, if Canada is to retain and develop her position as an exporter of forest products, the unnecessary losses through forest fires must be curtailed;

And Whereas in many cases forest fires have resulted in disastrous loss of life, and of valuable property other than timber wealth;

And Whereas apart from direct loss through the agency of fire, the vitality of the forest is thereby seriously impaired, thus rendering it unduly susceptible to attack by insect and fungus pests;

And Whereas forest fires disturb the equilibrium of stream flow, lower the water table, and frequently give rise to serious erosive effects;

And Whereas the great majority of forest fires are entirely attributable to inexcusable neglect or ignorance, and are therefore preventable, and the exercise of reasonable Prudence and proper carefulness on the part of responsible individuals would reduce the timber losses by fire in Canada to small proportions;

And Whereas it is desirable that the attention of the public be directed to the extent and underlying causes of the preventable loss of life and property by fire and to the best and most practicable means for its control and that a specific period of the year be set apart and properly designated for the dissemination of such information;

Now Know Ye that We, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council for Canada, have thought fit to appoint and do appoint the week commencing Sunday, the twenty-seventh

day of April and ending on Saturday, the third day of May in this present year as "Save the Forest Week," during which period the citizens of Our Dominion shall be entreated earnestly to consider the facts hereinbefore set out, to give careful heed to information disseminated by the various forest protective agencies, and in particular to act upon the following suggestions:

1 That settlers and others engaged in the clearing of land should fully observe the fire laws of the Dominion and of the province, which laws have been enacted for their protection, as well as for the preservation of Our timber resources;

2 That at this time of the year, when thousands are looking forward to spending their summer vacations in the woods, all should take cognizance of the fact that the camp-fire, which is one of the most pleasant and valuable adjuncts to camp life, may, if neglected, easily result in disaster; and that to prevent repetition of such losses as have been annually sustained from this cause, all persons should familiarize themselves with the proper methods of building, using and extinguishing such fires;

3 That loggers, saw-mill operators and others interested in timber operations should see that all equipment and appliances designed to prevent the origin or spread of fires shall be overhauled and placed in a state of thorough repair; that such persons should review with care the fire protection requirements of the legislation under which they operate; and that they should see that all employees working under their direction are properly instructed as to the danger of fire. Of all which Our Loving Subjects and all others whom these presents may concern are hereby required to take notice and to govern themselves accordingly.

In Testimony Whereof, We have caused these Letters to be made Patent and the Great Seal of Canada to be hereunto affixed. Witness Our Right Trusty and Well-beloved, Julian Hedworth George, Baron Byng of Vimy, General on the Retired List and in the Reserve of Officers of Our Army, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Knight Grand Cross of Our Most Distinguished Order of Saint Michael and Saint George, Member of Our Royal Victorian Order, Governor General and Commander-in-Chief of Our Dominion of Canada.

At Our Government House, in Our City of Ottawa, this twenty-eighth day of February, in the year of Our Lord one thousand nine hundred and twenty-four, and in the fourteenth year of Our Reign.


