Union freighter Chilliwack, Capt. C. B. Smith, arrived in port from the south on Saturday night and, after unloading lumber at the dry dock, proceeded to the Albert & McCaffery wharf to discharge 200 tons of Vancouver Island coal and 50 tons of cement. The vessel goes from here to Alice Arm, Stewart and Hyder with coal and, going south, will load ore at Surf Inlet.

Prince, arrived in port at noon yesterday with a cargo of nearly 400 tons of coal for the Prince Rupert Coal Co. which is being unloaded at G.T.P. wharf No. 1. The Anyox is engaged in the ore carrying business between Stewart, Anyox and Tacoma and it is some time since she made her last call at Prince Rupert.

Union steamer Cardena, Capt. A. E. Dickson, arrived from Vancouver and wayports at 2.30 yesterday afternoon and sailed at 8 for Stewart, Anyox and Alice Arm. The vessel had considerable general freight for Prince Rupert and brought the following passengers for Prince Rupert: C.
