"Old Time" Signals Not Good Enough Today

Mr. Dale says the game is getting too complicated, too "refined," too technical. In the old days (he says) when your partner led a heart and you wanted him to continue the suit, you played the highest heart you could spare. If you wanted him to quit leading hearts, you just played your lowest one.

Simple enough. And yet you can't always be that simple and direct in your partnership language any more. The newest gadget in the play of the hand—the suit preference signal—has changed things.
Take today's hand, for example. Mr. Abel opened the five of hearts and dummy's lone ace won.
Mr. Champion cased the situation in a flash. It appeared to him that Mr. Keen might well need to set up dummy's club suit to make her contract.

And to do that, she would need plenty of entries on the board. If one of those entries could be killed early, it might kill the club suit automatically.
One of the dummy's entries was the ability to trump a heart. Therefore, Mr. Champion wanted hearts continued before Mrs. Keen got to work on the clubs. In an effort to send that message to his partner he flashed his highest heart, the king.

At trick two Mrs. Keen led a spade and finessed the queen. Mr. Abel won with the king. Knowing a little about the suit preference signal, he read the king of hearts as a request to lead the higher of the other two plain suits. He returned a small diamond.
Mrs. Keen won with the ace, took a round of trumps, cashed the ace and king of clubs and ruffed a club. She went to dummy by ruffing a heart, led another club and ruffed it. The king of diamonds furnished the necessary additional entry to reach the set-up clubs and the contract was made.

Here is the way to recognize a suit preference signal. Say your partner flashes a high card in a suit you have led. He is merely requesting continuation of that particular suit UNLESS it is clear, beyond a doubt, that he could not possibly want it led again.
In this latter case, he is giving you a suit preference signal and suggesting the higher of the other two plain suits.

Pilots Can't Find Saucers

WASHINGTON (AP) — Radar which normally doesn't show something which isn't there—has picked up "flying saucers" near here for the second time within a week.
Jet fighter pilots searched the skies Saturday night and Sunday without directly contacting anything during six hours that four to 12 unidentified objects intermittently appeared on radar screens at the Washington National Airport and nearby Andrews Air Force base.
One pilot said he saw four lights approximately 10 miles away and slightly above him but they disappeared before he could overtake them.

TORONTO—A summer theatre with an international flavor has sprung up at Niagara Falls, Ont. Its producer, Maude Franchot of Niagara Falls, N.Y., declared neither hot air nor television will disturb her plans for its future.
Mrs. Franchot, who incidentally is aunt of movie-star Franchot Tone, scoffs at the "so-called T-V threat."
"Actors," she said in an interview while visiting Toronto, "prefer the stage."
People stayed home to see quiz shows and movies, but they still turned out for live theatre.

SOLVES THE PROBLEM
As for the hot air—an air-conditioning system she has installed in the Collegiate auditorium has solved that hot-weather problem.
A small woman with a golden tan, Mrs. Franchot is a grandmother "the same age as this century."
She lives in a 23-room Georgian mansion which she says is filled constantly with theatre folk, either dancers going through routines on the lawn or musicians practising on the front porch.
That has been her life since the Niagara falls summer theatre opened last season. And she has managed to line up an imposing list of acting talent from both sides of the border.

VISITING STARS
Franchot Tone, Edward Everett Horton, Blanche Yurka, are among the stars who have appeared with the resident company which is composed chiefly of Canadians.
Television, says Mrs. Franchot, doesn't appeal to actors because "they get a job on a half-hour television show and then, poof. They are out of work."
"If they strike a good play that has a long run they can make a lot of money in a short time," she said.
"Canadians," Mrs. Franchot continued, "are the most sought after actors in the English speaking world—because, having no union affiliation, they can act without threat of penalties."
If an English actor appeared in a United States production which failed, he was prohibited from acting in that country for six months.
