nation as an attack on herself. "We know what Russia and Russian policy are really like and that Russia would not stop her aggression by just attacking one country," Rajko Djedmanovic said in an interview. He is here

on a visit. He said Yugoslavia would be Canada's ally in any future war. "Yugoslavia split with Soviet Russia is a complete one and will exist as long as Stalinism

rules that country . . . "Our government is a Communist government but not in the Soviet sense of the word. Soviet Communism is Bolshevism, which is worse that Naziism, and has nothing whatever in common with our Communistic


