DRILL FOR OIL FORT NORMAN

Los Angeles Man Has Secured Claims and Will Put Down Well in Mackenzie Valley

EDMONTON, Feb. 13. — A. H. Stevens of Los Angeles, who in 1922 obtained title to 1,500 acres of oil leases in the Fort Norman area, has purchased an additional two thousand acres in Edmonton within the past few days, and will operate a drilling rig on these claims during the coming open season.

A heavy duty standard drilling rig has been purchased in Great Falls, Montana, for use in the north, and with other machinery and the necessary additional apparatus will be forwarded north as soon as river conditions permit.

Big Interests

It is understood that the Californian operator represents one of the larger oil interests which are battling for a foothold in the west, now that it has been definitely proven that this territory contains oil and somewhat sensational developments are looked for in this respect.

In addition to operating oil properties in California, Mr. Stevens is well known in this connection in Montana, Wyoming and Texas, while his company has recently acquired a concession of 22,000 acres from the government of Venezuela.

According to word received from the east it is stated that the Imperial Oil Company will also resume operations at Fort Norman in the spring; that the producing Number One well will be deepened, and that two new drillings will be put down.

News Confirmed

Recent government publications issued from Ottawa confirm the news which The Bulletin alone printed and reiterated time and again. This was to the effect that the deepening of the first well greatly increased the flow and that with this oil almost pure gasoline, the Norman field was one of tremendous potential wealth to Canada. That the larger oil interests are cognizant of this fact also is well known.

LUMBER DOCK AT VICTORIA

Establishment There Means Much to City Says President Chamber of Commerce

VICTORIA, Feb. 13.—The Canadian National Railway's plans for the establishment of a lumber assembly plant and terminal facilities here, were discussed by J. E. Dalrymple, vice-president of the traffic department of the C.N.R.

Mr. Dalrymple declined to name a definite date on which construction will be begun on a large twenty or twenty-six-car ferry which will connect the C.

N. R. terminus in the Inner Harbor with the Ogden Point piers. He ventured the opinion, however, that it would be in the near future.

Only one ferry will be used in the service at first, he said. Later, as the business grows, a second one will be added. In all probability both will be built on the coast.

Grain Elevator

In the railway official's opinion, the proposal to establish a grain elevator here is both feasible and possible. He said that the Ogden Point piers offered the best site for such a purpose.

Commenting upon the Canadian National Railway's plans as outlined by J. E. Dalrymple, vice-president of the traffic department, for a lumber assembly plant at Ogden Point docks, terminal developments and the linking up of the terminus of the line to the docks by means of a car ferry, C. P. W. Schwengers, president of the Chamber of Commerce, with whom the railway officials was in conference, hailed the developments as establishing Victoria as an export lumber seaport.

Develop Port

"It may possibly mean," said Mr. Schwengers, "that Victoria will develop into the premier seaport of Western Canada. It will make the handling of lumber a more profitable business proposition for the entire lumber mills. At the present time the cost of bringing lumber to the ocean docks either in Victoria or Vancouver is so prohibitive that business has not been attracted."

"Now the Canadian National has come to the rescue and placed matters on a different footing and offered an incentive for additional effort to get an organization working to cater to the export lumber business particularly in view of the fact that we will now be in a position to export lumber from the Outer Docks as cheap or cheaper than from Vancouver."

"When the scheme is in full working order its effect not alone in advertising Victoria but in bringing additional business of ocean-going shipping here should add very materially to the general business development of the city."

The National League baseball schedule will open on April 15 for the season 1924 it is officially announced today. The games on the opening day will be: Brooklyn at New York; Boston at Philadelphia; Pittsburgh at Cincinnati, and Chicago at St. Louis. Boston will get its opener on April 23 with Philadelphia, Brooklyn with Philadelphia on April 20, Pittsburgh with Cincinnati on April 24 and Chicago with St. Louis on April 23. The schedule is very similar to that of last year and provides for three, four and five day series with doubleheaders to be arranged here and there. The season will close on September 29 with Boston at Brooklyn, Philadelphia at New York, Pittsburgh at Chicago and Cincinnati at St. Louis. The schedule has been drawn up to fit in with that of the American League which will be issued shortly.
