LONDON, Oct. 28.—Premier Ramsay Macdonald in a final appeal to the nation before voting tomorrow says: "At the end of the hardest fight I have ever known the signs of a Labor victory are ummistakeable."

The fatest rates at Lloyd's in connection with the election ndicate that the wind has changed considerably of late in favor of the Conservatives. The odds yesterday were seven to two against a clear Conservative majority and 19 to one against a Labor majority.
