## ANOTHER GRAIN OUTLET MUST BE FOUND ON PACIFIC

M. M. Stephens Tells of Situation in Vancouver — Attended Martin O'Reilly's Funeral Friday

It is being demonstrated daily at Vancouver that one Pacific coast outlet for the prairie grain crops is not sufficient, stated M. M. Stephens on his return last night by the steamer Gardena from a business trip south. There are from 15 to 20 ships a day lying at anchor awaiting a berth, said Mr. Stephens. Prince Rupert must eventually get a share of the business.

While in Vancouver, Mr. Stephens attended the funeral of the late Martin O'Reilly last Friday. There were a number of present and former Prince Rupert people in attendance besides himself, including D. C. McRae, L. W. Patmore, Mrs. Sweet, Mr. and Mrs. J. Sweder and Mitchell Albert.

## LORD'S DAY LAW TO BE ENFORCED

Victoria Being Given Once Over by Alliance View to Improvements

VICTORIA, April 7.—The Lord's Day Alliance is preparing for a new campaign against amusements and places of business being operated on the Sabbath, according to announcement made last night by R. G. Howell, new secretary of the Alliance in Victoria.

The annual meeting of the Alliance was held last week in the presence of Rev. C. H. Huestis, D.D., secretary of the Alliance in British Columbia and Alberta. The retiring president, Rev. W. J. Sipprell, was re-elected. Dr. Huestis will return to Victoria in about ten days to confer with Major Hayward and Attorney-General Manson with a view to getting stricter enforcement of the Lord's Day Act here.

When asked where the Alliance efforts would be primarily directed in the new campaign, members stated that "the situation at the Gorge, where games of chance are little better than low-down gambling," would be dealt with.

"We do not object to the sale of Sunday newspapers, but we believe that a large portion of the newsstands should be closed up," said Mr. Howell. "Two or three stands should be able to do all the business on Sundays. The same applies to the drug-gists and we intend to approach the owners with a view to getting action in this direction."

## SYNOPSIS OF LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS  
Vacant, unreserved, surveyed Crown lands may be pre-empted by British subjects over 18 years of age, and by aliens on declaring intention to become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation and improvement for agricultural purposes.

Full information concerning regulations regarding pre-emption is given in Bulletin No. 1, Land Series, crown to Pre-empt Land, copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of Lands, Victoria, B.C. or to any Government Agent.

Records will be granted covering any land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberland, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 2,000 feet per acre east of that range.

Applications for pre-emption are to be addressed to the Land Commissioner of the Land Recording Division, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be obtained from the Land Commissioner.

Pre-emption must be occupied for five years and improvements made to value of \$10 per acre, including clearing and cultivating at least five acres, before a Crown Grant can be received.

## PURCHASE

Applications are received for purchase of vacant and unreserved Crown lands, not being timberland, for agricultural purposes; minimum price of first-class (arable) land is \$5 per acre, and second-class (grazing) land \$2.50 per acre. Further information regarding purchase or lease of Crown lands is given in Bulletin No. 10, Land Series, "Purchase and Lease of Crown Lands."

Mill, factory, or industrial sites on timber land, not exceeding 60 acres, may be purchased or leased, the conditions including payment of stumpage.

## HOMESITE LEASES

Unsurveyed areas, not exceeding 20 acres, may be leased as homesites, conditional upon a dwelling being erected in the first year, title being obtainable after residence and improvement conditions are fulfilled and land has been surveyed.

## LEASES

For grazing and industrial purposes areas not exceeding 640 acres may be leased by one person or a company.

## GRAZING

Under the Grazing Act the Province is divided into grazing districts and the range administered under a Grazing Commissioner. Annual grazing permits are issued based on numbers ranged, priority being given to established owners. Stock-owners may form associations for range management. Free, or partially free, permits are available for settlers, farmers and travellers, up to ten head.
