VANCOUVER, Oct. 29 .- Peter Verigin, head of the Doukhobor colony of British Columbia, J. L. McKee, member of the legislature for Grand Forks, and three other persons as yet unidentified, were killed early this morning on the C.P.R. Kettle Valley train Number 11, westbound, two miles west of Farron when an explosion wrecked the day passenger coach. Harry Bishop and another passenger are believed to be fatally injured. It was at first thought the accident was due to an explosion

of the gas tank beneath the car which contained illuminating gas, but an official statement issued by the C.P.R. at Winnipeg mulcated that the belief is entertained by the company that the explosion was caused by some human agency.

It is the belief that the plot was designed against the life of Peter Verigin. The official statement of the vice-president, however, concludes that according to information available "the explosion was caused by some human agency within the car, either intentional or accidental.
