He it was who defied the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway in the early days of Prince Rupert by staking a mineral claim on the main street and moving his printing plant thereon, when the railway company, fearing he would prove to be a troublemaker, refused to sell him a site.

No doubt Mr. Houston Jr., who is now making his political debut at Nelson, will be heard from later on, if he has the right stuff in him. But on his next attempt we feel sure he will be too wise to essay doubling such impossible roles as—

"Harry Houston — a young Labor advocate.

"Mr. Harry Houston—a Conservative opponent of Labor.

"H. Houston, Esq.—Provincial champion and sworn foe of Conservatism and Liberalism."
