CLAIMS SHOT GRAYLEY IN SELF DEFENSE AND DIED IN THE HOSPITAL

Alaska papers give particulars of the shooting of Bert Grayley at Ketchikan by Jim Smith. One account says: "Jim Smith, former patrolman of Portland, shot and killed Bert Grayley on the street last night after Grayley had beaten up Smith in a fist fight. "Grayley died in the hospital two hours after the shooting. An operation was performed in an effort to save his life. "Smith claims self-defense. "Smith asserts Grayley had threatened further bodily harm. When the men met last night Smith says he crossed the street to avoid Grayley and told the latter to stop. Grayley kept advancing. Smith shot twice, the first bullet striking Grayley in the leg and the second in the abdomen. "Smith is reported to have served sentence at Anchorage before coming here and is also reported to have killed a man while on the Portland police force."

BIG HERRING HAULS ON WEST COAST OF VANCOUVER ISLAND

VICTORIA, April 12.—Information has been received by the Victoria Chamber of Commerce that enormous hauls of herring have been made this season by seine boats operating in Barkley Sound. All previous records have been broken, larger quantities of fish are taken in each drawing in of the larger seines now in use, and less fish is wasted than formerly, the loss now having been reduced to a minimum as compared with a few weeks ago, when half the catch had often to be sacrificed owing to suffocation and crowding of the fish when the seine was drawn in.

One feature of the month's export trade was the shipment of 120 ounces of palladium having a declared value of \$10,008. The value of fresh halibut shipped during the month was \$17,000 more than was exported in March, 1923. Fisheries products as a whole showed an increase in declared value amounting to \$137,900. Furs exported gained in value approximately \$59,000.

erous leg of the entire flight around the world will be that across Behring Sea between Attu Island of the Aleutian group and Paramushiri Island, Japan. This span of wild and wicked land and water, which is over 800 miles long, offers a peril which only the most intrepid of airmen would attempt to navigate. Climatic conditions are "changeable as a woman's mood" and frequently boisterous while the villages are widely separated and means for making speedy rescues are absent. The aviator who encounters a forced landing on one of these rocky shoals or in the rough waters of the northern Pacific would face privation and possible death. For obvious reasons the four machines will fly closely together when making this passage. To further ensure safety, another United States gunboat has been sent from San Francisco to be close to the fliers when they are making this and other dangerous northern hops. At Paramushiri Island, three Japanese destroyers will meet the fliers to assist them in their communications.

bell conveyors. 5 A deep water port from harbor front to the sea and so safe, easy of access and attractive to shipping.

6 Approach over an exceptionally good railway grade through the mountains.

7 Natural advantages rendering the cost of maintenance negligible, and the raising of large revenue by harbor dues, cargo rates and other handling charges unnecessary.

8 Equality with other British Columbia ports in export rates from the Prairies and to the United Kingdom.

Therefore be it resolved that in the opinion of this Board of Trade the government of Canada, when appropriating money for the development of shipping facilities at the Pacific coast and grain handling facilities in particular, should carefully weigh the above-mentioned questions, and if found in the best interest of the people of the Middle West and the grain growers in particular, utilize the natural advantages of Prince Rupert by constructing a terminal elevator at that point with all the necessary subsidiary facilities.
