**New Year May Be
Momentous Politically.**

The Twentieth Century has witnessed many momentous years. Comparatively speaking, 1924 may be expected to eclipse all preceding years in many ways, and from a purely political viewpoint this is true.

Before this "New Year" has given way to another, political history in British Columbia will have been made and recorded. And while politics are often considered apart from national and provincial development, the fact remains that the two are one.

It is absolutely essential that at this stage of British Columbia's growth a strong, progressive, virile administration should be in power.

The party system of politics has been the foundation of Anglo-Saxon national life. Just as Christianity revolutionized the world, so have Anglo-Saxon principles of government and justice dominated, the latter being the logical sequel of the former. The truth of this is forcefully illustrated by the adoption of those principles by practically all progressive nations.

Where third parties—Labor, Progressive, Socialist, Soviet or Independent—have sprung into existence, they have invariably materialized through a temporary disruption of old-line party practices, which have caused a demand for reform—not of acknowledged party principles but a reform from the digressions directly responsible for that disruption.

Electors Alone Will Decide New Party's Fate.

Today in British Columbia a third party has sprung into prominence, but the elector alone can decide the genesis of the movement. If founded upon sincerity it will prevail but if grounded in selfish ambition or motivated by the lust for personal profit the movement must naturally fail.

Probably before another winter comes a general election will be held. The wiseacre names September as the logical month. Meanwhile, a Royal Commission will pass judgment upon the Oliver government and the Conservative opposition leader. That white elephant, the P.G.E. Ry., is the "ace in the hole," and the political prophet, who is often not without honor even in his own country, foresees the complete vindication of the Oliver administration, as well as the opposition leader, and the consequent downfall of the aspiring McRae forces.

Statements on the floor of the Legislature, from members holding all shades of political opinion, concede the Hon. John Oliver has headed his government with honesty and integrity of purpose. That is perhaps the principle which will result in victory for the government party when the issue is again placed before the electorate.

Political Situation Will Be Cleared Up.

With the time getting short before the appointment of the Royal Commission to investigate Provincial Party charges, unusual interest is being manifested by the man in the street. Premier Oliver has been commended and condemned for promising an investigation. Those public men chiefly interested in the development of British Columbia maintain that there is nothing to investigate in connection with the government's handling of the P.G.E. Ry., and therefore public money should not be spent on an enquiry. Premier Oliver has always held this view and taken the stand that until definite charges were made money should not be wasted on a Royal Commission. However, he maintains that the public life of the province is directly affected and harmed through the spreading of charges of wrongdoing and it is in the public interest to clean the matter up.

Undoubtedly, the investigation will have a far-reaching effect. Third party adherents admit that if they are unable to substantiate their charges their party will die, while Mr. Bowser, opposition leader, recently declared at Sidney that if the charges made against him were true he should not be representing Vancouver in the Legislature nor leading his party.

So the political situation will be cleaned up once and for all. In the opinion of those versed in public affairs, the "dust" of the Third party has been called; both government and opposition will be completely vindicated and at the coming general election the voters will witness a straight two-party fight. With the Third party made up largely of disgruntled Conservatives, who demand a change in leadership, the advantage naturally lies with the Liberals, who anticipate a sweeping victory when election time comes.

Old Corn-Cob Has Longer Itinerary Than at First Expected—Going Around World

The old corn cob pipe which was started on a trip across Canada from Prince Rupert via the Canadian National Railway last year is far exceeding its originally planned itinerary for it is now in Australia having been to China and Japan in the meantime. Next it is going to India and Europe.

G. F. Johnstone, formerly G.N.R. city ticket agent here and now general agent in Sydney, Australia, has sent to the Daily News a copy of the Sydney Daily Telegraph which carries a picture of the much travelled corn-cob and also the following story about it:
