OTTAWA, Jan. 4 .- Hon. Sir Lomer Gouin, minister of justice in the Mackenzie King administration since it was formed, resigned yesterday on account of ill-health. Premier King announced that he was reluctantly accepting the resignation so that Sir Lomer might get the long rest ordered by his physicians since before he went to Europe to attend the 1mperial Conference and the League of Nations committee.

Premier King declined to make any statement regarding a possible successor to Sir Lomer.
