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

LONDON, Jan. 22 .- In connection with next year's British Empire Exhibition, a Fellowship has been formed, with the Prince of Wales as its first member and president. The primary object of the Fellowship is to promote Imperial trade and industry, and the scheme embraces the provision of prizes and scholarships, the former designed to further the cause of Imperial education. The scholarships of £1,000 each will be intended, in the case of a young citizen of the Overseas Dominions, to give him a university or technical education in the Motherland; and in that of a young citi-
