

Ground Connection

The 1700 pound steel plate of the Bowdein was used as the ground connection for the radio apparatus. A few wires were also frezen in the ice to act as counterpoise ground for an antenna stretched between the ship's mast and the shore.

The aerial was pointed directly towards Jack Barnsley's station at Prince Rupert because preliminary tests indicated it was the best route of communication. It was noticed that waves under 200 meters in length travelled much better than the longer wave lengths. The Bowdoin carried a 100-wat transmitter with two 50 watt tubes. The short wave tuner ranged from 450 to 800 meters and the long wave set could tune in from 10,000 to 20,-000 meters.

"We had a wonderful foreign news service especially from the big station at Nauen, Germany, and Leafields, England," stated Dr. MacMillan. Besides transmitting the 30,000 words, Operator Mix copied over 100,000 words of press matter. A great deal of it was handled while the Bowdoin was locked in the ice north of Greenland.
