Report Presented to Conference
Answering Red Atrocity Charges

TORONTO (CP)—A "voluminous" report was presented to the 18th International Red Cross Conference Thursday by the international committee answering Communist charges against the committee regarding alleged atrocities in Korea.

Paul Ruegger, president of the international committee, announced the release of the report during sessions in which the Russian, Communist Chinese and Czechoslovakian delegations denounced the I.C.R.C. as a tool of the West and withdrew financial support from it.

Despite the Communist attacks on the committee the general commission—one of four conducting conference business—voted 61 to 14 to continue the mandate of the finance commission, set up four years ago to accept contributions from Geneva Convention countries. The international committee is designated as the enforcer of the Geneva Convention, which sets down rules for the treatment and exchange of war prisoners.

The Soviet bloc delegates charged that the I.C.R.C. has repeatedly ignored atrocities committed against civilians and prisoners of war.

Lt.-Gen. Nikolai Slavin, head of the Russian delegation, said the committee had hidden atrocities during the Ethiopian war, the First and Second wars and the Korean war.

Mrs. Li Teh Chuan, head of the Communist Chinese delegation, condemned the United Nations for permitting alleged Kojie prison camp massacres. She charged that villages had

Colorful Private Party Shapes
Up at Plush Farouk Apartment

CAFRI, Italy (Reuters) — A colorful private party appeared to be in the offing today as publicity-shy former King Farouk of Egypt settled down for a week's stay in a plush hotel on his honeymoon Isle of Capri before going to the United States.

Bodyguards and servants, at the behest of the exiled former monarch, scoured the island for five hours to find 10 Japanese lanterns. At about midday the frantic hotel manager sent out special messengers to find two large beach umbrellas for Farouk.

The hotel Eden-Paradiso on a cliff edge in the exclusive Anacapri district has been virtually requisitioned by Farouk, his wife, Narriman, their six-month-old son, King Ahmed Fuad II of Egypt and two young daughters. They have taken over the top floor complete with the roof garden. Burly Egyptian bodyguards stand watch.

FRUIT FOR MID-WEEK

Tuesday and Wednesday are the days for fruit salads. Fresh Pear, Celery, Nut Salad—Three ripe pears, lemon juice, two three-ounce packages cream cheese, mayonnaise, salt, one-half cup whipped cream, two cups diced celery, one-half cup chopped nuts, head lettuce.

Peel, halve and core pears. Sprinkle with lemon juice. Blend enough mayonnaise into cheese to make smooth and fluffy. Add salt to taste. Fold into whipped cream. Add celery. Arrange pears on head-lettuce cups. Top with cheese mixture and garnish with nuts. Serves six.

BANANA SALAD

Friday is the day for Banana Melon Bowl Salad. For one serving: Peel a fully ripe banana, cut lengthwise into halves. Place halves cut sides up, side by side, in centre of salad plate. Put melon balls at each end and between the banana halves. Garnish with crisp salad greens. Serve with mayonnaise or cream dressing.
