**FIFTY MINUTES TOP OF MOUNT**  
 Legs Dangled Into Space as Party Admired View: Alpine Club Breaking Up  
 BERG LAKE, B.C., Aug. 7. — The most satisfactory account of the climbing of Mount Robson given so far was that brought back to camp Sunday night by a party of climbers. They were Miss Helen Buck of Brooklyn, N.Y., a climber of wide experience in the Swiss Mountains; Rev. N. R. Harpe and D. D. Watchler, both of Regina. They had the most perfect weather all through and their guide, Conrad Zain, was able to arrange the various periods of their climb so as to spend fifty minutes on the top-most pinnacle admiring the view with their legs dangling over the space.  
 Saying Goodbye  
 Gradually the Alpine Club camp is breaking up. Every morning little parties gather around the main tent to say good-bye and good luck till next year, and then set off either on horseback or afoot down the long winding mountain trail to Mount Robson station, the pack train follows anon—pack horses laden with duffel bags containing everything from personal kit to the sketching outfits of the artists and botanical specimens collected from the mountain meadows up in the high passes.  
 The numbers around the convivial camp fire dwindle night by night and the club songs rise thinly and a little sadly on the crisp night air. The last parties came back weary but triumphant from the heights of Robson and Whitehorn and turned in early for a good night's rest before leaving early this morning. The twenty or so out at the Calumet camp are returning by twos and threes. Today they will all be scattered to uttermost parts of the continent and there will be no one left at the camp except the few club officers and the local guide in charge of the construction. In another day or so he and two men will have packed the tents and gone, leaving Berg Lake to dream once more in its undisturbed peace in the heart of the Rockies.
