

Whites No Chance

After brief mention of the geographical principles of interracial relations the inference was drawn that white colonists have no chance of successfully occupying land near the crowded parts of Asia or accessible to the fast multiplying negroes of Africa.

Considering next inter-racial relations, Dr. Gregory suggested that in countries where white and colored races lived side by side, four policies might be folflowed-(1) Amalgamation by inter-marriage; (2) co-residence with complete social separation; (3) disfranchisement of the colored population; or (4) the segregation of the different races in separate countries in communities. With regard to the first of these, controversy has long raged, many authorities holding that the effect of inter-racial breeding is to lower the physical and mental level, others asserting the conrary. Apart from scientific opinion in the matter, said Dr. Gregory, there still remains a large mass of prejudice among Teutonic peoples against such race amalgamation, especially in the U.S.A., where intermarriage non between whites and negroes is almost illegal. In South America. on the other hand, no such prejudice exists and only a small University Professor proportion of the population is now of pure European descent.
