A letter has been received by the city from C. D. Howe & Co. of Port Arthur, who have been commissioned by the department of Trade and Commerce to design the elevator here, inquiring into the power that may be available. The company wants to know if 800 horse power could be supplied bettering of the conditions for and what phases and voltages could be furnished. The letter is receiving the attention of Ernest Love, superintendent of utilities, and a report will be given to the council at the earliest possible moment.

The power requirement can be handled by the city if it is so decided. The 800 horse power will be the maximum demand, the letter pointed out.
