SCHOOLS MAKING GOOD PROGRESS IS REPORT TO BOARD

At the meeting of the school board last evening Principal Brady of the High School reported the total enrollment of pupils 135, attendance 134, perfect attendances 107. There were 49 boys and 86 girls attending. Five visits had been made by trustees and four by others. He asked for improvements to the chemistry laboratory which were granted. Lectures had been given during the month by Miss Randal and himself.

For Borden Street School Miss Mills reported a total attendance of 289 and an average of 97.5 per cent.

At Booth School Principal Hartness reported an increase in number of pupils over last year. Everything was going smoothly. He had found it difficult to get substitutes when teachers were away and it was ordered that a notice be inserted in the local papers asking for applicants.

The matter of a school library was mentioned and held over for the securing of further information.

PARENT-TEACHERS TO USE BOOTH SCHOOL FOR ENTERTAINMENTS

Delegation to School Board Told to Use Their Own Discretion as to What Use They Would Make of It

A delegation from the Parent-Teachers' Association consisting of Mrs. Arnott, Mrs. Pyle and T. Ross Mackay waited on the school board last night to discuss with them the question of the use of the school auditorium by that organization. They already had been given a general permission to use the building but for what class of entertainment it could be used had been questioned.

Mrs. Arnott explained the objects and aims of the association which was to secure the co-operation of parents and teachers for the benefit of the pupils and to aid in such things as school libraries.

Trustee Casey was of opinion the association should be encouraged.

Trustee Rochester took exception to the use of the building for whist drives, which he contended did not come under the heading of education. He was opposed to the schools being commercialized.

Trustee Williams also did not favor that kind of entertainment in the schools while Trustee Parker thought the matter should be left in the discretion of the officers of the Parent-Teachers' Association.

After considerable discussion the delegation was told to use the building at their discretion and not to be too timid about going ahead.

The board accepted an invitation to attend a meeting of the association Wednesday night when the Governor-General's medal would be presented.
