"It was when my son was somewhere in France and the mothers and fathers of Edmonton were eagerly scanning the bulletin boards and the daily newspapers for news of their beloved ones. I was stopping in an apartment house and had room No. 13. As I was sitting in my room one evening I heard groans and crying—not very loud but more like they were borne to me in vibrations. It gave me the impression that someone had suffered terribly in that room.

"As I heard it again the second evening I quite made up my mind that if it happened again I would ask for another room. The third evening I plainly heard my son crying as he used to cry when he was a little boy and hurt himself. The only difference was that the crying was in his man's voice. Then I felt sure that he was hurt.

"As I awoke the next morning I felt rather than heard someone pass by my bed. Again it seemed like vibrations, almost as a wind blowing, only it seemed like a person and alive. About nine o'clock the same morning as I sat alone in the room I heard a rap, seemingly a short distance away. Then there was a loud knock upon the door as if someone had struck it with their fist. I arose and opened the door but nobody was there.

"It took generally about four weeks to hear from France. Then a wire came that my son had been wounded in the Battle of Cambrai, nearly a month before. This battle lasted three days. I felt that my son had been very near death and I called it vibrations. As he and I were constantly thinking of each other we did not need any modern invention such as the wireless to bring us together. Nothing could separate us. Even the sounds of that terrific battle were carried to me.

**SLANDER SUIT AGAINST PARSON**

**Dr. Clem Davies of Victoria Comes to Trial on Skidoo Day This Month**

VICTORIA, April 10.—The hearing of the slander suit of J. P. "Doc" Smith, the R.C.M.P. narcotic operative, against Rev. Clem Davies, pastor of Centennial Church here, has been set for April 23, in Vancouver. Frank Higgins, K.C., and C. L. Harrison, city prosecutor, of this city, are acting for Dr. Davies, while "Doc" Smith will be represented by a Vancouver firm of barristers.

It is understood that Dr. Davies will ask for a trial by petty jury. He has four days in which to make a decision in this respect.

Friends of the popular Centennial pastor have started a movement to collect funds for his defence in the coming slander suit. It is realized that, like most clergymen, the doctor is not overburdened with worldly goods, and while in this instance the issue is not one of drug trafficking, but a civil suit, they feel their pledges of moral and financial support to Dr. Davies during the Royal Commission inquiry on narcotics should be fulfilled. Promises of support have come in from members of all creeds, and it is thought that Rev. Dr. Davies' financial requirements will be met during the coming week. Dr. Davies last confirmed the report that he was receiving contributions of money at the parsonage, and thanked anonymous donors who wished him well with their offerings.

**Vancouver Paper Urges That With Only 4,000 People Separate Existence Ridiculous**

The Vancouver Sun advocates the union of the Yukon with this province. It says:

"British Columbia and Yukon Territory should be amalgamated. It is ridiculous that an area containing only 4,000 people should duplicate in large part the governmental organization of a full-sized province.

"The prairie provinces are no more naturally one area from an economic standpoint than British Columbia and Yukon.

"The principal industry of the latter is a principal industry of the former. The people are of the same western type.

"And Victoria is not only much nearer Dawson than Ottawa, but understands the problems of the north far better.

"A lot of unnecessary overhead expense could be eliminated if Yukon became Northern British Columbia instead of a separate

**PAY FOR NEXT WAR IN CASH SAYS BANKER**

**American Economist Tells Ottawa People Industrial Machine Must Be Rebuilt**

OTTAWA, April 10.—Economic reasons will do more to prevent future wars than anything else, in the opinion of John F. Sinclair, American author, banker and economist, in addressing the Canadian club here.

"Let Canada and the United States cooperate in the re-building of their industrial machine, so terribly wrecked by the war. Kill this war business, in which there has been so much traffic and intrigue that even the bankers themselves have been fooled," he said.

"If there is to be another war," Mr. Sinclair said, "then the cost of the war must be paid in cash, 100 cents to the dollar. It must not be a charge on future generations, as was the last war."

For a nation to rank as first class, according to Mr. Sinclair, it is necessary that it meet two

VICTORIA, April 10.—Refusing to pay his bills or leave the institution, David A. N. Ogilvie spent two and a half years in the Jubilee Hospital, and died last week at an advanced age. A search of his effects then disclosed the fact that he possessed about \$16,500 and a small cottage and lot.

Over \$500 in cash was found in the hospital, over \$200 of this being in \$5, \$10 and \$20 gold pieces done up in a chamois bag. In three banks Mr. Ogilvie had a total of approximately \$16,000 deposited.
