In the Letter Box

RATEPAYERS' ASSOCIATION PROTEST AUCTION SALE IN SECTION 2

Editor Daily News — In your issue of yesterday you reported that the resolution of the Ratepayers' Association protesting the auction sale of lots in Section 2 was not read but filed, which of course was correct.

Nevertheless, in fairness to the Ratepayers' Association I would like to explain that when the resolution came up Alderman Japp asked that the letter be not read because he was withdrawing his motion concerning the auction of lots in Section 2, and His Worship the Mayor decided to file the letter, everybody believing that the matter was settled.

Alderman Clapp then brought another notice of motion which was practically the same as the former, as far as the protest of the association was concerned, not extending the sale over lots in all sections of the city except Section 1.

I am making no comment on this question, but I want to correct a false impression that is going round that the council did not want to pay attention to the resolution of the Ratepayers' Association.

WOMEN OF INDIA SEEKING RIGHTS

Say They Want to be Able to Sit in Legislatures and Want Act Amended

LONDON, Oct. 22.—From distant India comes a cry of the women for further political rights and privileges. The Women's Freedom League which, under the leadership of Mrs. Pankhurst, used to smash windows and pour kerosene into the mail boxes in an endeavor to convince men that women should vote, has received from India an account of the struggle going on there to give women the right to membership in the legislatures.

At a representative meeting of Indian women held recently in Simla under the presidency of Lady Shafi, the question of the disqualification of women for election as members of the several legislatures was discussed. The following resolution supported not only by the Simla women but by the Bombay Women's Council and the Women's Indian Association, Madras, was passed unanimously:

"This meeting of Indian women, belonging to different parts of India, places on record its very strong opinion that the disability of women to stand as candidates for the legislatures be removed forthwith, and that the rules under the government of India Act be amended accordingly."

DR. J. C. SPENCER VISITING ISLANDS

Tribute to Man Who Has Done Splendid Service on Coast

SKIDEGATE, Oct. 22.—Dr. J. C. Spencer, a pioneer medical missionary of the north, is at present visiting the Queen Charlotte Island on a tour of inspection.

He is a man well known to the northern country, being stationed at various points during the past thirty years. Going to Hazelton about the year 1894, at a time when this country was in its roughest state, he did splendid work among the Indian people. Patiently he labored, preaching the gospel, attending the sick and cheering the downhearted. From here he went to Bella Coola, where he did equally good work.

In the year 1906 the people were fortunate in having him stationed on the Queen Charlotte Islands as a medical missionary to the Indian village of Skidegate. For eight years in the same patient spirit he went about his daily tasks, at the same time administering the gospel to the neighboring settlements and always ready to do all in his power to assist them. He won the hearts of all those about him and it is with great pleasure that they welcome him on his present visit.

Dr. Spencer, after a service of thirty years, is still carrying on this work along the Northern Coast of British Columbia.

FISHING ACTIVITIES AT QUEEN CHARLOTTE'S

Big Pack This Year at Lagoon Bay; 250 Cohoes in Catch

SKIDEGATE, Oct. 22.—All fishermen from Lagoon Bay cannery came home on October 16. All have done well at the cannery, which has closed for the season. The total pack for the cannery is 64,000 cases, which is considered good for a one line cannery. W. Trotter was manager there this season and everyone hopes he will be there again next year.

Bert Hanson, skipper of the Greer Starrett, the fish packer owned by the Canadian Fish & Cold Storage Company, brought over the mail for Skidegate. This is not the first time the company has done this. It has often happened during the past five years. Both fishermen and settlers were pleased to welcome Capt. Hanson who is an old timer here.

T. G. Russ of the gas boat Chumney caught 250 cohoes on the Skidegate bar. It took him only six hours and he sold them to the Cold Storage Company at 40c each.
