WANT MILK TRAIN HERE SATURDAY

Parent-Teachers Endorse Request to Have Train Arrive Saturdays

The Parent-Teachers' Association last night at their regular meeting endorsed a request which is being made to the railway company asking that the time freight which now arrives here on Sunday should be changed to Saturday to enable fresh milk to be brought into the city on that day.

It seems that at present the time freight and the passenger train arrive on the same day with the result that no fresh milk arrives from Thursday to Sunday. With a Saturday train there would be fresh milk all the time and this would be of great benefit to children.
