## DEER HERDS OF ENGLAND OLD

One Date is Back to Time of Queen Elizabeth and Another Four Hundred Years

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Family history and family trees are by no means confined to the English aristocracy; there are several herds of deer in Great Britain whose records go back more than four hundred years. The 1924 register of the Deer Herd Book Society of Great Britain, the social register of the animals, just published, gives a complete list of the ages and distinguishing marks of the herds.

The herd at Dean Park, Peterborough, which went into residence more than 400 years ago, is the topnotch in the unmixed blue blood of English herds. Among other deer ranking above the proletarian is the 300-year-old herd of Lord Clifford, which has not mixed with other blood since 1672, and the herd of Lord Cobham, which has maintained its exclusiveness since 1785.

**Thirteenth Century**  
Sir Robert Harvey of Langley Park owns a herd of mixed deer which have been bred there since Queen Elizabeth used the park as a royal hunting ground. A thirteenth century mixed herd is owned by Lord Hastings, and the Dukes of Norfolk have maintained a herd on their estate in Norfolk for about 700 years.

Altogether there are about 110 privately owned herds in Great Britain, including three belonging to King George, but which do not rank with their royal master in the matter of pedigree. On some of the large estates of the Midlands as many as 400 deer are kept.

## PRINCESS MAKES EMERALDS POPULAR

Fashion's Latest Fad in Great Britain Follows Use of Stone by Mary

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Sapphires and emeralds have become the most popular jewels, apart from the ever-fashionable diamonds and pearls, among the English women, according to West End jewelers, while for some unaccountable reason there is little call for rubies, and amber and jade have lost much of their popularity of a few years ago. Flexible platinum bracelets studded with diamonds, emeralds, sapphires and rubies, are fashion's latest fad.

Princess Mary is said to have been responsible for the sudden popularity of emeralds. Her engagement ring was a particularly beautiful emerald, and created an immediate and pressing demand for the stones. Then it was discovered that sapphires combined strikingly with the green jewels, and they also jumped into favor.

One feature of the new fads, according to jewelers, is the passing of the choker necklace of pearls or large metal or colored beads. Ropes of pearls, however, are as popular as ever.

## AMERICAN STOCKINGS BEING SOLD IN EUROPE

ZURICH, Switzerland, Dec. 18.—The American feminine stocking is the most popular hosiery in many parts of Europe this season because of its full fashioned effect, found usually only in the most expensive wear. Many of the American goods reaching the continent are of artificial silk and sell from 90 cents to \$1.50 a pair, the women contending that the American stocking, even at this cheap price, outwear European hosiery many weeks.

## CUT PROFITS CANNON MAKERS

League of Nations Traffic Commission is Dealing With Matter

LONDON, Dec. 18.—War or no war, the munitions business in Europe is good. During the years which followed the close of the late international cannon makers' peace until 1923, the exports of material of war from one European country into another, not including warships, airplanes or similar equipment has overseen the alarming total of \$250,000,000. And the world has been almost pacific during this time.

The traffic commission of the League of Nations, which has rummaged out these figures, has set about to cut the dividends of the martial manufacturers by introducing a convention, which has been distributed to all nations, for the establishment of an international control of arms. The British government is understood to be fully in accord with the project, and its delegate to the next meeting of the commission to be held at Geneva next May will be instructed to support the document.

## MANY SPORTSMEN IN NEWEST PARLIAMENT

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The membership of the new House of Commons is much like that of the mid-Victorian period in the matter of sportsmen. One of the London daily sporting papers, throughout the recent campaign, carried a list of 180 candidates whom it claimed to be real sportsmen, and with the election of 150 of these men it remarks that "the electors are again showing a strong tendency to send good sportsmen to Westminster as they did in the days

of the late Queen."

## TOKIO REGAINING PEOPLE

TOKIO, Japan.—Tokio has resumed her plate as the fifth city of the world, according to a police census taken recently. After the earthquake of September, 1921, Tokio lost a quarter of her population and dropped behind Berlin. The police enumeration shows that the city now has 1,917,000 inhabitants, a gain of 390,000 from the figures just after the earthquake, but 260,000 less than before the disaster.
