

Public Schools And City Councils.

The status of the schools in their relation to the city councils has been a bone of contention for many years, in fact since the present system was evolved. It is claimed by members of city councils that they have to raise the money for the schools and the school board has nothing to do but spend it. This system they say, tends to extravagance. School boards do not have to prune expenditures like the councils because all they have to do is say: "Raise so much money for us." Then the aldermen get the blame for the high rate of taxation.

The claim of the educational authorities is that the school boards are kept separate because of a desire to keep the schools out of such petty prunings and discussions as are evident in the last night for Montreal and Otcity councils.
