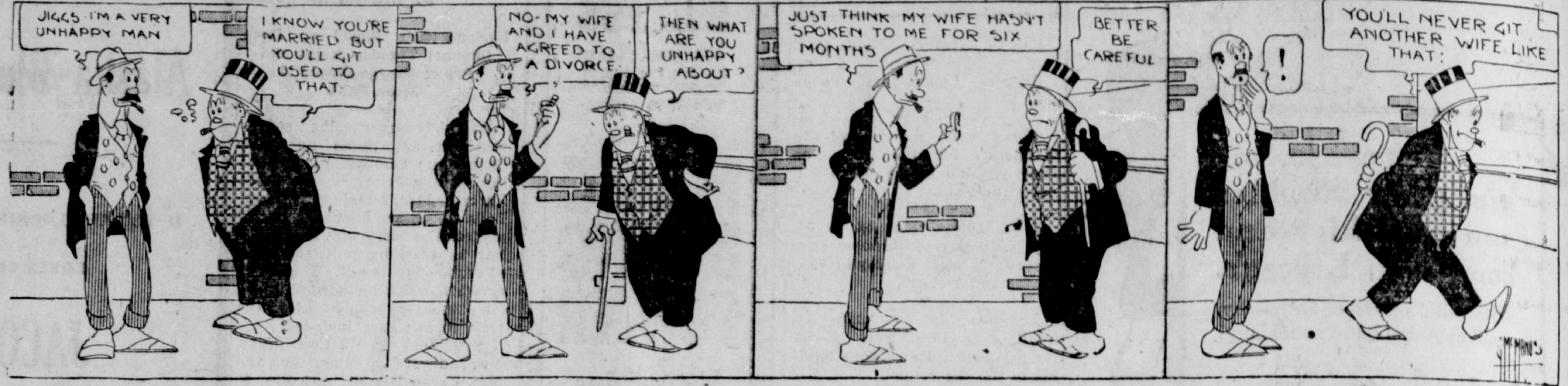

PEACE RIVER RAIL OUTLET

City Council Goes on Record Favoring Construction of Branch Line in British Columbia

The city council of Prince Rupert decided last night to lend its voice to the agitation for a western railway outlet for the Peace River valley when the following recommendation from the finance committee was adopted:

"That the council go on record as being in favor of united action being taken with other municipalities on the western line with a view of pressing for the construction of a branch line into the Peace River at the most westerly point that the engineering features will permit and that the Board of Trade be asked to co-operate."

Ald. Collart, in speaking to the resolution, said that it was the idea to get all the people west of McBride to support the recommendation. A new pass had been found that would make Prince Rupert the outlet for the Peace River valley instead of Vancouver. The distance via this pass to Prince Rupert from the Peace River would be some 200 miles shorter than to Vancouver via the Brule cut-off. The line would also be easier of construction. The resolution should be sent to all centres up the line between here and McBride for endorsement.

The pass referred to by Ald. Collart is the Monkman pass which would bring the railway line tapping the Peace River from Grande Prairie to Hansard station, not far east of Prince George. The Brule route, for which Vancouver is pressing, would come out just east of the Rocky Mountains to Brule in Alberta.

Sport Chat

There will be a joint meeting of the Fair Board, Elks, Moose, Baseball Association and Football Associations tonight to make final arrangements for the Fair Week sport program. Ben Self announced yesterday that baseball teams from Ketchikan and Anyox would be here as well as a football team from Anyox. In addition trap shooting teams may come from Ocean Falls and Ketchikan. The excursion from Anyox will arrive on the Cardena on Tuesday and will return home on the Venture on Friday. The Ketchikan crowd will arrive on Thursday night on the steamer Prince Rupert and will be taken home again on the Prince John Saturday night. The various games will, of course, have to be arranged accordingly. Instead of playing native football and baseball games in the morning as has been the custom in the past they will be staged in the afternoons immediately preceding the main features of the day.

JIU-JITSU LAST NIGHT

Prof. Takagaki Proved Himself Master of Nels Jepson in Japanese Game

Prof. Takagaki of Vancouver proved himself the master of Nels Jepson in the jiu-jitsu contest at the Empress Theatre last night. Despite his game efforts, the Spokane wrestler was subjected to two falls at the hands of his Japanese opponent who is said to be an expert at this particular game.

It was the first exhibition of jiu-jitsu to be given in the city and a good crowd followed it with interest. The contest divided itself into fifteen minute stages and falls are decided not in the usual wrestling manner but by an opponent crying out. The rules are not so stringent as in wrestling and holds not allowed in the regular mat game are permitted. Takagaki scored his first point when he put Jepson out with a neck hold after six minutes. The second session went the full fifteen minutes and the Jap got the second fall with a twist of the arm of his opponent in five minutes.

There were two boxing preliminaries, the first a four round exhibition between Harry Anderson and Ernie Warren and the second a bout between two Japs, one of Vancouver and the other of this city.
