

of Works Recommends That Heating System in Hall be Changed

The city council is considering the proposition of converting the heating system in the City Hall from coal to oil burning. Last night the Board of Works presented a recommendation that an) oil burner be installed at a cost of \$1,000. It was decided to refer the matter to the finance committee for report.

W. Longwill, agent for the oil burning apparatus, appeared before the council and explained the details of installation and pointed out that money would be saved in heating by making the change. The C.N.R. reported a saving of fifty per cent in fuel burners guaranteed a saving of one third. In one case where the change had been made, the coal cost had been \$60 per month as compared with \$1.10 a day for oil. Three barrels of oil was considered equal to one ton of the best Vancouver Island coal.
