WINNIPEG, Aug. 26.—Continued rainy weather has delayed cutting of crop in all three prairie provinces but this week will see binders working, nearly everywhere with cutting general go rate of 15 cents per ton. This by the first of the month, according to the weekly crop report of the Canadian National Railways issued today. Recent rains. have worked a wonderful improvement in the crop situation in most districts of Saskatchewan where many districts are now anticipating crops of twenty bushels per acre and more.

## Committee's Report

"Your committee recommends to the directors of the Chamber of Commerce that they place themselves on record as opposed to the establishment of a harbor commission at the present time for the reasons set forth hereunder:

"It would be a hig mistake to establish a harbor board in Victoria along the lines of the Vancouver .organization. oday is the cheapest port for all vessel to call at on the Pacific Coast. At the present time the only port charge assessed against the vessel is sick mariners' dues.

which are assessed at all ports in Canada. In addition to this in Vancouver, vessels are assessed with harbor dues by the Vancouver Harbor Commission, and the cargo is assessed with a carcargo rate is in addition to the wharfage charges , which are the same at Victoria as at Vancouver. This means that the charges on a vessel handling 8,000 tons of cargo are \$1,200 for cargo rates. The harbor dues on this vessell would amount to \$120! Thus in all, it costs \$1,320 more at Vancouver than Victoria. The result of these charges are just beginning to show to the advantage of Victoria, and it would seem very unwise for Victoria to take any action which would inevitably result in the establishment of
