## CAPTIVES TALK IN CONFERENCE

Novel Discussion Takes Place at Luncheon in Lincoln Heights Jail, Los Angeles

LOS ANGELES, May 22.—Chief of Police August Vollmer and his police captains recently instituted a new form of conference when they held a round-table discussion on crime, its causes, and means for its prevention with the inmates of the Lincoln Heights jail here.

At a luncheon in the jail the prisoners, at the invitation of the chief, told the arms of the law just what they thought of policemen, courts and law enforcement in general. Chief Vollmer said he learned much from the conference, including the following:

The character of men arrested should be more closely investigated by the arresting officer.

A court should be established to handle vagrants exclusively.

A sympathetic officer should be appointed to hear the pleas of these vagrants and those arrested on other petty charges.

Some of the remarks by prisoners that led up to these conclusions were:

By an Irish prisoner, called by his co-inmates, Sam: "These cops pinch us because that's their business and they don't care if we're innocent or not. If they get nothing real against us, we're canned on a charge of being vagrants and a boob judge gives us 90 days for having an empty stomach."

By an educated prisoner, who said he had made it his business to study crime from both sides: "There is, apparently, only one thing for a man to do when he is broke and hungry, and that is to 'knock somebody off.' I believe that the majority of small crimes are caused by that reason and no other."

By a gray-haired inmate, whom all saluted as Vincent: "Conditions are not going to be a bit better until the public is brought to place trust and confidence in the police department, withstanding their general well-

By an admitted bootlegger: "What I want to know is this: When you pinch a man and get 18 gallons of good whiskey from him, why is it that the records show you confiscated only three gallons?"

Chief Vollmer asked for the names of officers who did this, but at a warning from other prisoners, the bootlegger sat down.

## ROTARY INTERCITY MEET IN VICTORIA

The banquet will be followed by dancing.

The Rotary Clubs of Bellingham, Anacortes, Mount Vernon, Sedro-Wooley, Port Angeles and Nanaimo have been asked to participate, and it is expected that representatives from the Vancouver and Seattle Clubs will be also in attendance.

A feature of the gathering will be the addresses that will be delivered by Governor Miles Higgle and Governor-Elect R. A. Booth, both of whom have been asked to the party and will likely be present.

being their exactions in wages, hours of labor and extra privileges grew so onerous that the big landowners finally agreed to put thoroughgoing communism into effect. The land was turned over to the whole population with the conditions that the proceeds were to be divided between labor and owner.

As a result offers for allotments of land poured in and the new tenants invoked the high cost of labor and living, and all the old complaints, to excuse offers of about one-third less than the land is really worth, and the scheme has collapsed.

## GERMS OF TERRIBLE STOCK DISEASE ARE STUDIED BY GERMAN

LONDON, May 20.—The results of the discovery that Professor Frosch, a German scientist, has made of the germs of foot-and-mouth disease are still being awaited. All that is known at present is that Professor Frosch, who is a very distinguished man and one of the oldest workers as a colleague of Loeffler, has read a paper in Berlin, in which he claims to have cultivated, using solid media in particular, the microbe of foot-and-mouth disease. He has not divulged as yet all the particulars of this method but it would seem from the information available that it is quite likely he has actually grown the microbe. What the results will be, if the facts are correct, remain to be seen.

**TURKS GRANT AMNESTY**  
CONSTANTINOPLE, May 22.—The National Assembly has passed a bill granting amnesty to all military and political prisoners arrested during the war or armistice period. The bill excepts 300 prisoners stipulated in the Lausanne Treaty, whom the Angora government determined should not benefit by the terms of any amnesty.
