TO LINE UP THE FARMERS AND OTHERS

Committee of Council to Discuss With Board of Trade Sending Delegation East

COLLART URGES ACTION

Suggestion That Effort be Made to Seek Co-operation Elevator in Campaign

On the motion of Alderman Collart seconded by Alderman Casey the mayor last night appointed a committee from the city council consisting of Aldermen Collart, McMordie, Casey their representatives in the House and the Mayor to meet a committee of the Board of Trade discussing with them the advisability of sending a man through the country to line up the farmers and others in favor of the erection of an elevator here and possibly to visit Ottawa also for the same purpose.

Alderman Casey brought the matter up first and urged that something be done and then Alderman Collart announced that he had intended to propose a resolution.

Alderman Collart said:

"The farmers of the prairies are the proper people in my mind to which we should appeal for support, because they represent votes, numerous votes, and only the voting power can get anything out of a parliament, no matter what color that parliament is."

Vancouver's Advantage

"Vancouver has not one representative in the House of Commons on the government side; we have one, and yet Vancouver can secure millions from the government while we cannot get a cent. Why? Because the people are in Vancouver. They have the population of which we are lacking, therefore my suggestion is: That we send to the prairies a suitable man to hold meetings among the farmers and get them to pass resolutions to be sent to men Collart, McMordie, Casey their representatives in the House and the Mayor to meet a committee of the Board of Trade discussing with them the advisability of sending a man through the country to line up the farmers and others in favor of the erection of an elevator here and possibly to visit Ottawa also for the same purpose."

Collart's Plan

"I was quite pleased to see in tonight's papers that our member at Ottawa did not think it advisable to send a delegation to Ottawa.

"We have sent delegations to Ottawa in the past and I must say that the results have been rather disappointing. Consequently I have endeavored to find out what was the reason for the failure of our delegation and I have come to the conclusion, and I sincerely believe that the only reason is that the City of Prince Rupert is too small to make her voice heard with success, and that what this city wants in the backing of somebody that will have more weight than we have to force the attention of the government upon our needs.

"Knowing the reason for our failure, it is easy to find out where to get a remedy to the situation, and I suggest that the only remedy is to get behind us the people that will be vitally interested in backing up our de-

ELKS BANQUET GRAND OFFICER

W. A. Cantelon Guest of Honor of Local Lodge at St. Regis Last Evening

SPLENDID ADDRESS

Over fifty members of the local Elks Lodge sat down at an impromptu dinner last night at the upstairs dining room of the St. Regis Cafe given in honor of W. A. Cantelon of Vancouver, past grand exalted ruler of the order, who is in Prince Rupert for the first time and who addressed the members. Ben Self, exalted ruler of the local lodge presided and the dinner was an excellent one. Music was provided by the Elks orchestra led by William Balugno.

Common Purpose

Mr. Cantelon in his address said he regretted being unable to visit the lodge during his term of office but he was glad to be able to make up for the omission now. Wherever Elks were assembled there was a common purpose, all being imbued with the same motives.

The fraternity was unique in that it combined the ideas and ideals of the service clubs, the social clubs and the fraternal organizations. Service, sociability and fraternity were linked in one. The organization was undenominational, non-political and embraced men from every class, trade or calling.

Fourfold Aim

Elkdom stood for four things: Equality, justice, brotherly love and fidelity. There must be the ideal of equality for they were all working for a common purpose. All were equal in the task. They were equal to serve or equal to assume responsibilities. It was purely democratic. They stood for absolute fair play. If they could not create confidence between members then Elkdom had failed to assume its true place. They also learned to treat each other as brothers and to live in peace and harmony one with the other. They could carry this sentiment into the lodge room or into the wider field of action. Fidelity to their creator, country, fraternity and themselves was also part of their obligation. The true Elk was true to his friends and rose to be master of himself.

Beneath all this, Mr. Cantelon said, was the one outstanding principle of service. No individual, city, or country could live through all time without being imbued with the idea of service. He instanced the city of Athens which had been imbued with high ideals and which had given the world Pericles, Plato, Aristotle, and a score of other brilliant men whose names would never be eradicated. If this was true of cities and of nations it was also true of individuals.

Done Great Things

The speaker said he had found that Elks had done great things in cities where they lived. One of their aims was to spread sunshine in the lives of those on whom the shadows were cast. He asked that in Prince Rupert the organization be imbued with these principles and ideals. Then they would not fail to make "life sweeter, men better and the world happier."

Ben Self expressed appreciation of the address and thanked the visitor.

John Dybhavn proposed a toast to the Grand Lodge after which the gathering dispersed.
