## Think They Received Unknown Message from Mars at Vancouver B.C.

#### Mysterious Signals Received at Point Grey but Local Wireless Men do not Consider Them Important

VANCOUVER, Aug. 22.-Mysterious signals picked up at the Point Grey wireless station during the past week culminated today in strange groups of sounds causing wireless experts to wonder if the planet Mars was trying to establish communication with the Earth. Four distinct groups of four dashes each came through the air today. The signals were in no known code starting on a low note and ending with "Zip." Neither the spark or continuous wave system was responsible for the phenomena.
