## VARIOUS PAVING BYLAWS ADVANCED

**Ald. Casey Suggests that Matter of Surfacing New Streets be Considered**

In connection with the passage of several bylaws for street paving at last night's council meeting, Ald. Casey suggested that it might be wise to consider the matter of surfacing the new roads with tarvia. The present method of street work was being generally approved with only one criticism. It was felt that they might not withstand the heavy rains. Though some of the roads had already been completed, it was not too late to consider the matter of surfacing on others and, if considered advisable and economical, provide for it in the bylaws. He was not recommending that this be done but merely asking that the matter be considered. He was not prepared to say himself that the tarvia method was altogether satisfactory. Certain sections of Third Avenue did not seem to be standing up very well.

Ald. Perry stated that it was the intention to do something along these lines next year. It was too late to put tarvia down this season. He admitted that the new streets would probably need surfacing.

Ald. Collart thought the new roads should be allowed to settle before surfacing them. Even if a coat of tarvia was put on this year, they would probably need another next year. He was not in favor of increasing the cost of original construction on outlying sections.

Ald. Casey was inclined to believe that Ald. Collart's contention might be correct.

Bylaws providing for the paving of Sixth Avenue from Fulton Street to Taylor to a width of 18 feet; Sixth Avenue from Fulton Street to Hays Cove Circle to a width of fifteen feet; Eighth

Avenue from McBride Street to Seventh Avenue and Hays Cove Circle, and Alin Avenue from the junction of Second Avenue to Seventeenth Street were advanced to their third readings.

The construction bylaw for the paving of Hays Cove Circle was laid over for a week so that it may be redrafted. This is made necessary through the decision to cut through the Booth School grounds.

## WOMAN PUBLISHER WITH MUCH COURAGE

Office of Paper Was Sacked by Mob But Policy Remained Unchanged

QUEBEC, Oct. 7.—Mrs. Honore Chasse, a newspaper editor of 14 years' active experience, and a woman with courage enough to hold her French language newspaper, L'Evenement, to a conscription policy in the war years in such an anti-conscription city as Quebec, died here recently at the age of 59 years.

No woman in Canada has played a newspaper role such as that of Mrs. Chasse, a number of these years being in the troubled period of Canada's history. Her husband was a prominent figure in the Quebec district. He was the owner of a small paper, the publication of which was ceased shortly before his death, but he continued in the printing business and when he died Mrs. Chasse took over the management of affairs for herself. She did so well that when the Conservative party bought L'Evenement, an evening French-language newspaper, in 1909, Mrs. Chasse was appointed general manager, and for eleven years she managed the paper, holding it firmly to a Conservative policy. She advocated conscription during the war years and when mob rule was in force for a time in Quebec city the office of L'Evenement was sacked, but this made no change in her policy. Mrs. Chasse was the mother of eleven children, nine of whom are still living.
