LARGE SUMS JAP ELECTION

Something Like Twenty Million Dollars Expended on the Thousand Candidates

TOKIO, June 24.—The most expensive election in Japan's parliamentary history was that held recently to choose the 464 members of the House of Representatives. Estimates of the total expenditure of the candidates and parties, not including the necessary expenses of the government on election machinery, range between \$17,000,000 and \$22,000,000, with most of the estimates approaching the larger figure.

With more than 4,000 candidates in the field, it is estimated that each aspirant spent an average of \$20,000.

The contest for the Morioka seat, in which Korekiyo Takahashi, president of the Seiyukai party, defeated his Seiyuhon rival, Ichimin Tago, by a narrow margin of 49 votes, brought out the most lavish spending. Mr. Takahashi is believed to have spent nearly \$150,000, while his defeated rival disposed of about \$100,000.

In Tokio
 In Tokio the largest amount was spent by the independent candidate Takagi, who got rid of \$50,000 and won. The average for each candidate in Tokio is placed at \$25,000. That money counted for a great deal is shown by the case of a candidate named Mori. He had only \$10,000 to spend and received only 90 votes to his successful rival's 3,000.
