### PRINCE RUPERT MEN FINED AT SMITHERS

Two Exceeded Bag Limit When Hunting in Bulkley Valley This Week

The rosy reports broadcast on the coast by the members of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade who recently spent a week in these parts spelled disaster for Geo. Findlay and Wm. Reid of that town, who, carried away by the glowing accounts of excellent shooting, backed by numerous exhibits, made a trip to Barrett on Monday. The conditions were found to be all that was claimed and the hunters started right in, which was quite within their list of privileges. But in failing to stop at the bag limit they fell foul of Constable Fairbairn and Chief Service, who confiscated the total cut together with the weapons. Last night the men walked in and pleaded guilty to exceeding the speed limit on game, paying in ten dollars and costs, which they charged up to the rattling good time they had in a country where the grouse are plentiful and tempting.—Interior News.

### SON SHOT IN MISTAKE FOR A GRIZZLY BEAR

Antoine Isadore of Moricetown Victim of Hunting Accident in Bulkley Valley

SMITHERS, Sept. 19.—The provincial police were called on to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of Antoine Isadore, aged 16, who was killed at Moricetown on Friday last.

It appears that the deceased in company with his father and another Indian, One-eyed William, were out after grizzlies, and in the hunt became separated. Some time after the father seeing a stealthy movement in the distance, immediately concluded it was a bear and placing his rifle to his shoulder made unerring aim. Hastily proceeding to the spot where the supposed bear should be he was horrified to find the lifeless body of his son—another victim to mistaken identity.

Chief Constable W. J. Service was communicated with and, accompanied by the coroner for the district, S. H. Hoskins, was quickly on the ground. All the facts of the case being fully investigated it was decided that an inquest was unnecessary as the shooting was purely the result of an accident.
