POSSIBILITIES FOR USE OF WATER INSTEAD OF COAL FOR POWER PLANTS

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 7.—White coal has possibilities of future development in the United States eight times as great as the present development, according to information given out today by the geological survey. The bulletin sets forth that the developed potential waterpower of the country as at present installed, including plants of 100 horsepower or more, is 9,087,000 horsepower. Roughly estimated, it is said that this can be developed to 72,000,000 horsepower. Washington has greater horsepower developed than any other state. It is closely pressed by Oregon and California.
