RADIO PLANT BEING INSTALLED AT JASPER

POSSIBLY THERE MAY YET BE NEWS OF MAJOR MARTIN SAYS DESPATCH

New Wireless Station is Installed at Jasper Broadcasting Soon

MONTREAL, May 7.—A wireless receiving set of high power is being installed in the new convention hall at Jasper Park and later it is planned to install a broadcasting station there which will reach all the country round as far west as Prince Rupert and even Queen Charlotte Islands, according to A. S. McLean, general superintendent of Canadian National Railway hotels, who has just returned from the west and who has inspected all the hotel buildings and looked into present conditions and prospects.

Mr. McLean says that ten new sleeping lodges have been equipped with forty rooms at Jasper, all additional to what was there last year. In addition there is the new convention hall capable of accommodating 250 guests and with moving picture and radio equipment. There is in addition a new boat house on the lake and a photo and curio shop which will supply the need of the guests and help advertise the park.

According to Mr. McLean, conditions in western Canada appear to be improving and the outlook for the hotel business this summer is excellent. Mr. McLean, who has just returned from an inspection tour of the summer hotels of the system, reports that a very large number of inquiries for accommodation at Jasper Park lodge have been received and indications are that the increased facilities there will be utilized to the full. In Winnipeg, business at the Fort Garry is brightening appreciably and he expects this hotel to enjoy a prosperous summer.

The final Republican primary will be held in Cleveland in June.

The state Democratic primaries, which were also held here, gave W. G. McAdoo a majority of 64,242. The delegates were uninstructed.

Mr. McAdoo and Ex-Governor Radston of Indiana are running neck and neck for the Democratic nomination with Senator Underwood of Alabama a good third.

During his trip, Mr. McLean visited Highland Inn, Algoma Park and Minaki Inn, Minaki Ontario, personally supervising important alterations and additions being made to the fire-fighting equipment of both hotels. New and larger water mains were laid, higher pressure pumps installed and the buildings equipped with an elaborate and fool-proof fire alarm system and additional fire escape equipment.

The Democratic convention will be held in June in New York.

IN BENGAL, INDIA

PATNA, India, May 7.—A serious epidemic of cholera has swept the Behar division of Bengal where more than 10,000 deaths occurred this year. In the worst affected district 1,000 died last week. The epidemic is still spreading.

COOLIDGE HAS LEAD ALREADY

Is Ahead of Johnson in San Francisco Primary as far as Counted

SAN FRANCISCO, May 7.—Returns from yesterday's Republican presidential primaries for about two-thirds of the total precincts give Senator Johnson 203,604 votes and President Coolidge 219,934 votes.

This is merely a state primary but general surprise is expressed that President Coolidge should get such strong support in the state that Senator Johnson was said to have "carried in his vest pocket." There is still a possibility that President Coolidge's majority may be wiped out but, through the support given him in other states, most of which have already had their primaries, he has enough votes to practically assure him the nomination.

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C.N.R. USING RADIO IN U.S.

**Messages Regarding Canada are
Being Broadcasted from
New York and Chicago**

MONTREAL, May 7.—To advertise the attractions of Canada as the centre of the world's greatest out of doors playground and to stimulate interest in the industrial possibilities of the country, the Canadian National railways have extended their radio broadcasting points to New York and Chicago. The Canadian National railways are already broadcasting from Montreal, Ottawa, Winnipeg, Regina, Saskatoon, Calgary and Edmonton.

The inauguration of these two new broadcasting centres for the system marks the first time that any Canadian Company has contracted with United States broadcasting stations to transmit their message over the air.

In New York the first broadcast will be made by the Radio station of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, Tuesday evening May 13 at 7.15 New York Time. At Chicago over "The News" radio station this evening at 10 o'clock Chicago time.
